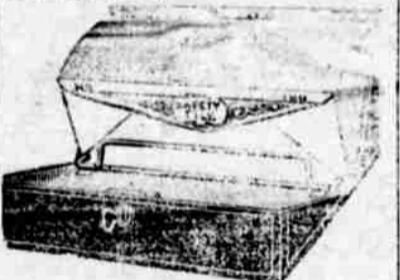

NEW NEGRO LABOR SCHEME.

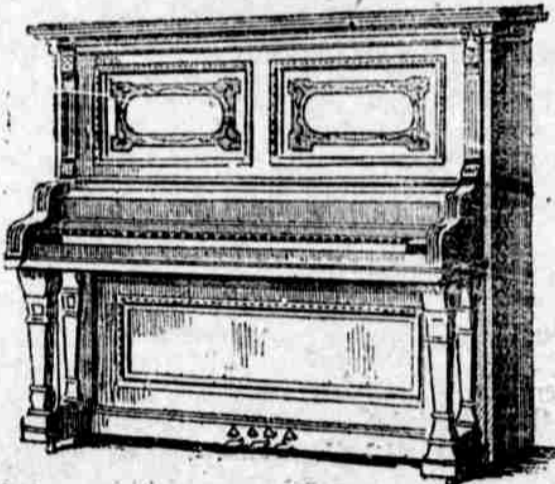
Montgomery, Ala., Dec. 21.—J. C.
Leftwich, an intelligent negro and
Federal receiver of public money in
Alabama, is now on his way to the
Hawaiian and Samoan Islands to in-
vestigate the conditions there with
reference to the proposed migration of
Southern negroes. He goes as the
agent of his race and of a large sugar
producing syndicate which has made
substantial investments there.

The syndicate has experimented with
native labor, with Chinese and Japa-
nese, but without good results, and has
decided that the Southern negro will
suit its purposes. Leftwich, enjoying
as he does the respect and confidence
of his race, was selected as a proper
person to investigate the proposed
scheme. He states that the plan con-
templates the removal of many thou-
sands of negroes to the islands.

Coroner's Inquest.

The coroner's inquest in the case of
the death of Joe Burgess turned in a
verdict of accidental death at the con-
clusion of their deliberations Saturday
afternoon. However, Banavitz, the
young man in whose hands the shot
gun was when the Portuguese boy was
killed, was held for manslaughter in
the first degree. Bail in the sum of
\$1,000 was fixed and the amount fur-
nished.
