CHINAMEN HAVE "SWEET TOOTH" TOO CHICAGO, Oct. 31.—"Sugar candy" was observed in Chicago yesterday by the consumption of more than a ton of the saccharine article...

The first shipment of cane arrived Sunday from New Orleans and every Chinaman in Chicago came to Clark street to gorge himself on the sweetened stalks...

"Chinamen seldom eat candy," said Frank Woy, the Mayor of Chinatown, "but I never knew one who wasn't crazy about sugar cane."

A dozen stores on Clark street had cane on sale today, and there isn't a stalk of it left. The prices vary according to the size of the stalk...

"Chinamen have a weakness for chocolate ice cream soda, perfumed soap, sugar cane and having their photographs taken. I have seen my countrymen spend \$15 for soap to take back to China with them."

TO DIE OR RUN AWAY; WHICH IS KING'S DUTY?

Paris Paper Gets Notable Opinions on the Propriety of King Manuel's Flight.

PARIS, Oct. 15.—Its Lisbon correspondent having telegraphed that King Manuel was eager to leave his capital when his throne was threatened...

Paul Bourget, an "Immortal," says he can not give an opinion until he knows all the facts, but he confesses too great admiration for Manuel's uncle, the Duke of Orleans...

Countess de Martel, who is famous as "Gyp," writes: "The attitude of the King of Portugal? Why, it is pitiful, heart-breaking and normal; more Orleans than a Braganza, he follows tradition. He is worthy of his good grandfather, King Louis Philippe..."

Pierre Wolff, a playwright, contents himself with this: "I would have been embarrassed in his place."

Every right should be respected; those of peoples and those of individuals. However, every victim of this right justly exercised is pitiable. Logical thought salutes the hangman, but the heart cries out and would save the victim. How are you to get out of that difficulty? This is all I have learned from life."

What would he have gained if he had had his friends and subjects killed?"

Maurice Barres, of the French Academy, puts it thus: "There are duties and professional risks to which one must be faithful even to the end. What remains to be known is this, was there one regiment left that shouted 'Vive le Roi!'"

Louis Berlioz says in brief that if Manuel had the courage of aviators like Latham, Leblanc, Paulhan and Chaves, he never would have fled; adding: "It was his duty to die if necessary."

NEXT TO TUBERCULOSIS Heart Disease Ranks Second Among Causes of Death in 1909.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—Heart disease ranked second only to tuberculosis of the lungs as the principal cause of death during 1909, among the gainfully employed male persons in the United States death-registration area...

The percentage of deaths caused by heart disease was 11.9, being highest among men employed in domestic and personal service during the several age periods from 25 to 54, but between the latter age and 64, greater among men engaged in agricultural pursuits than in any other of the five classes into which the occupations have been divided.
