IN THE DISTRICT COURT.

Sentence Is Suspended in all Serious Cases but One.

When the District Court opened for business at 9:30 o'clock this morning the courtroom was crowded with people of all classes, some wearing bandages around their heads, others having black optics and not a few with bruises. Deputy Marshal Brown conducted the prosecutions. In all cases that came before the Court those who had counsel asked for a continuance. The following disposition was made of some of the cases to-day:

Kanalu, larceny in the third degree by stealing a gold watch and chain of the value of \$80, pleaded guilty. Sentence suspended till March 12.

C. L. Brito, embezzlement, continued till moved on.

Patrick Cullen, murder, continued till March 12.

Robert Lsing, intending to commit an offense, discharged.

Fred Naylor and Carigan, assault and battery, discharged.

Matthew Noall, violating mail laws, remanded till March 12.

J. W. Carroll, assault with a weapon, remanded till March 12.

Pukela, larceny in the fourth degree, on Feb. 19, by stealing a clock, the property of a Japanese, valued at \$250, pleads guilty. Sentence suspended till March 12.

The same individual pleaded guilty to the larceny of a silver watch valued at \$6, also the property of a Japanese. Sentence suspended till March 12.

Kahale, a hackman, cruelty to animals, pleads guilty, fined \$15.

Captain Hill, attempting to commit the offense of barratry in Honolulu on Feb. 22 for that he did while being the captain of the steamer Waimanalo and while that steamer was within the maritime jurisdiction of this country, piratically and feloniously attempt to run away with such steamer, pleads guilty. Case remanded till March 12.

There were nineteen fines for drunkenness and four discharged.

Seven natives, male and female, pleaded guilty to selling spirituous liquor without a license. Sentence suspended in each case.

A large number of cases were remanded to some future date.

Civil cases are being heard this afternoon.
