That County Convention.

The republican hosts to the number of thirty-seven representing forty-seven delegates, assembled at Bloomington one week ago to day to elect eleven delegates to Pocatello convention.

Oliver Dunford, in the absence of chairman Hoover, called the meeting to order. Committees on credentials and order of business were appointed.

Alf Budge was made permanent chairman and Oliver Dunford secretary.

The election of delegates was then taken up. Seventeen men were nominated and the following number of votes were cast for each:

The convention adopted a rule that the eleven receiving the highest number of votes, provided they were majorities, were to be declared elected. This left Dr. Hoover and Mr. Hulme tied, and the doctor asked that his opponent be declared elected, thus saving the necessity of a ballot.

A motion asking that the delegation use its best endeavors to have Pres. Budge elected a delegate to St. Louis, was carried, after which the convention adjourned.

NOTES.

The Bloomington people got up an elegant spread for the delegates, which was heartily enjoyed by, all and for which the convention returned a vote of thanks.

The defeat of Dr. Hoover and Joe McCart disgusted the Montpelier delegation and they were sore to the quick.

The quarterly conference did not keep some of the bishops and elders from attending the convention. Not a gentile from Montpelier was elected as delegate. Gus Spongberg and Judge Patten both vote in Paris.

The brass band discoursed sweet music before and during the convention.

The pre-arranged scheme of some of the Paris politicians went through with the exception of Wright and Anstin' who were beaten by Spongberg and Hulme.

Paris is represented by five, Montpelier three, Bloomington two and St. Charles one delegate.
