HORSE-SNOWSHOES.

Why Not Get a Few Pairs for Use on the Willow Creek Divide?

By to-morrow the road to the Gold Belt will probably be open so that teams may travel over it. In two or three weeks the road to Smoky via Willow creek will have to be similarly opened. But on this route there is a stretch of some eight miles where the snow will be so deep that but slow progress can be made in breaking a road. If the breaking team were provided with horse snowshoes, such as have been used for years in the mountains of California, its task would be comparatively easy, and the road opened much sooner than otherwise. Inasmuch as there is no assortment of such shoes in this region, might it not be the thing for the parties interested in opening the road to send for, say, enough for four horses, and lend them to the parties who will do the breaking? The shoes could be taken care of, so that they could be used again whenever needed, and in future the job of breaking roads hereabouts would not be near as expensive as it is to-day.

THE IDAHOAN MINE VICTIMS.

Thomas Walker and Archie Watson Buried Yesterday.

The funeral of Thomas Walker and Archie Watson, the victims of the accident at the Idahoan mine last Saturday, took place yesterday. Early in the morning the bodies lay in state in the sample rooms of the Alturas Hotel, where all who wished called to take a final look at the deceased. About noon the remains, headed by the Hailey Brass Band, were escorted to the Episcopal church, where the Rev. Mr. Osborn conducted the services for the dead, after which the procession left for Bellevue, where the remains were interred. The cortege was nearly a mile in length.

When the caskets were lowered in the graves, one of the boxes was ascertained to be fully six inches too short. One end was thereupon knocked out and the graves filled up.

THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

Business Transacted at Their April, 1887, Session.

The Board of County Commissioners met to-day, and transacted the following business:

N. R. Nellis, constable of Glenn's Ferry, resigned, and Hardie Dial was appointed instead, with bonds fixed at \$1000.

The bond of D. H. Gray, as Justice of the Peace of Arco precinct, was examined and approved. Also, that of Henry D. Watson, as constable of Soldier precinct; that of J. G. Peck as Justice of Crichton.

George S. Graham's bond as constable of Toponis precinct was approved.

The Result of a "Drunk."

Willie Lindell, Claudie Leroy, and Bessie Hall, three fast women, appeared before Judge Lemmon to-day, and preferred complaint against Al. Harris, on three charges—two for assault and battery, and one for assault with a deadly weapon. The defendant is a gambler. When he heard of the charges, he went to the courthouse and surrendered himself, but was allowed to go on his own recognizance, until 1 o'clock to-morrow afternoon, when he will have a hearing.

SMALL HAILEY INCORPORATE!

During the past week or so the question of incorporating Hailey under the general incorporation law passed at the last session of the Legislature has been quietly but generally discussed, and public opinion seems to be that it would be a very desirable move.

Under the law referred to there are to be five trustees who serve without compensation, and there are no salaries unless a special tax should be levied by a vote of the taxpayers, for a special purpose. Then the collector gets the usual percentage. But there is no other expense.

Incorporation would enable us to do much that we cannot do at present. For instance, it would enable us to get electric lights at night, to clean the streets and alleys, look after the general health of the inhabitants, etc. The benefits would be great and without any expense worth mentioning.

The Trustees for the first term would be appointed by the Commissioners, and would doubtless be good, active, reliable citizens, as the entire list of taxpayers would be open for selection.

ABOUT WOMEN.

Mrs. Zerelda G. Wallace is lecturing in Rhode Island for the woman suffrage amendment.

Miss Marietta Holley ("Josiah Allen's Wife") has written a new book, "Samantha at Saratoga."

Miss Alice R. Jordan, who took the degree of LL.D., at the Yale Law School, last June, has just been admitted to practise in the Superior Court of Michigan.

Miss Elvira Inzulza Diaz has received the diploma of licentiate in medicine and pharmacy at the hands of the rector of the University, Valparaiso, Chili, who congratulated her as the first of her sex to receive it in Chili.

Mrs. Mary A. Livermore, in a recent address to the students of Bates College, admonished them to look on a healthful body as the foundation of a vigorous mind. She maintained that the American girl was slender and graceful enough by nature, and needed no corsets.

Dr. Julia McNutt, at a recent meeting of the New York branch of the Association of Collegiate Alumnae, said that 10,000 of the yearly deaths in the city were those of children not one year old, and that the great death rate at Randall's Island was because there were not trained nurses for the babies, but they were cared for by women "sent to the Island for 60 days." This is one of the things that would soon be set right if some "city mothers" shared with the "city fathers" in the administration of affairs.

THE "ALIEN LAND LAW."

It Almost Seems as if its Passage was Secured by British Gold.

This very important enactment has not yet attracted the attention it deserves, and though the ingenuity of lawyers can probably be counted on to find means of evading what appear to be the plain provisions of any law, yet it is much better that the law should not be brought into contempt by this course; and where, if enforced, it would be so manifestly injurious to a great industry, it is hoped it will be amended, by exempting its application to mines and mineral lands.

No one in this country, however ardent a protectionist he may be, wishes to protect us against the importation of coined gold in exchange for the possible raw material in the rocks, especially when we generally get the best of the bargain. And we know of no case of the purchase of such threateningly large mining estates as call for restrictive legislation in this regard. Considering the results of a good many English investments in American mines, we are almost inclined to think that this Alien law has been instigated by the malevolent use of "British gold," and we call upon our patriotic representatives to remove the stigma which this supposition, if true, would involve.
