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WORLD'S RECORD IS BROKEN BY TANLAC

CITES RULINGS ON AUTOMOBILE LICENSES

Persons purchasing automobiles before August 1 must obtain a full year license and cannot take out what is known as a half-year license, as many have believed, according to W. A. Kincaid, Ada county assessor.

"Recently, I have had many inquiries in regard to the half-year license on automobiles," says Mr. Kincaid. "A half-year license starts on August 1 and the person licensing the car must come into possession of it after that date in order to obtain a half-year rate under the law.

"Many inquiries are made under what conditions can an individual carry a dealer's license. An individual, according to law, can carry a dealer's license only after he has made application accompanied by the fee for a license of his own, and then can carry this license only 15 days. The dealer cannot let an individual have a number under any other conditions and comply with the law.

"In exchanging a licensed car for another people should take care of the value of their license in the trade and leave the plates on the car for which they were purchased. There is a heavy fine for the violation of each of these laws."

MANY ACRES OF STATE LANDS ARE TO BE SOLD

BOISE, July 1.—The most important state land sale ever held in Idaho, and one of the most important ever held in the intermountain section, will begin July 14, at Arco, and close July 25 at Rexburg. Included in the sales are 45,000 acres of land appraised at from \$10 to \$45 per acre. The lands are situated in Butte, Bingham, Bonneville, Teton, Fremont and Madison counties all except the Butte county offerings being included in what is known as the Upper Snake River valley, one of the best known and most fertile dry farming sections in the west.

The terms of the sale are one-tenth of the purchase price and the first year's interest on deferred payments in cash on the day of sale, and the rest in forty annual installments at 6 per cent interest. Some of these lands have been under lease, and contain improvements which must be paid for in full on the date of sale. In cases where the land is in crop, the present tenant is to be allowed the benefit of the harvest.

The sale opens at the courthouse at Arco, on the Oregon Short Line Mackay branch, July 14. The next sale is at the Bingham county courthouse at Blackfoot, July 16. Then follow sales at Idaho Falls, July 18; Driggs, July 21; St. Anthony, July 23, and Rexburg, July 25. The land department has separated the sale dates so that those who are unable to secure land at one sale may have opportunity to look over the country in other counties before the next sale comes on and select the land on which they desire to bid.

The state land department, under the direction of I. H. Nash, land commissioner, has prepared a circular showing a map of the lands to be sold, location of the lands and considerable valuable information as to the precipitation records, railroad facilities, crop and climatic conditions and other matters of interest to the intending purchaser. 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LIVING MONUMENT TO OUR DEAD HEROES

Memorials in cold stone with their allegorical figures are not enough to perpetuate the memory of our dead who lie in France. At least that is the belief of the citizens of Clarinda, Iowa, who on Memorial Day contributed a fund toward a living monument. Twenty-one French war orphans make up that living monument, one fatherless child for every Clarinda boy who gave his life for the cause of humanity. The public spirited men and women of that town will care for these little French orphans with this fund, paying for their support through the American branch of The Fatherless Children of France an organization co-operating with a similar one of which Marshal Joffre is head, to care for the little French children left fatherless through the havoc of war.

There are 60,000 French war orphans still unplaced on the list of the American organization. Three dollars a month, or ten cents a day, will support one of these children. The Clarinda citizens have paid for each child "adopted" \$36.50 for a year's support, with the intention of repeating the sum annually until the child is capable of caring for itself. This small sum supplements an equal amount paid annually by the French Government to each war orphan and, tiny though it is, provides for the child's support.

In its reconstruction work, France has wisely centered its greatest efforts on the care of its war orphans and "The Fatherless Children of France," recognizing that these little victims of the war should be the wards of a world made safe through their father's sacrifice, undertook, early in the war, to furnish godmothers and godfathers for these children—American godparents who would contribute ten cents a day toward their support that they might remain with their mothers instead of being placed in institutions, and who would, besides this, write to the little ones to whom they had become benefactors. Donations of any sum from a dime (one day's support) to \$3.00 (a month's support) are solicited, as well as the pledges of \$36.50 a year. A yearly pledge enables one to select as one's protegee a special boy or girl from the organization's lists of children. Mrs. Walter S. Brewster of Chicago has been appointed chairman of a special campaign to secure these ten-cents-a-day adoptions and is making an earnest appeal from the campaign office, Room 635, 410 S. Michigan Ave., Chicago.

LEAGUE MEMBERS ASK A FEW QUESTIONS

NAMPA, July 1.—The row in the camp of the Non-partisan league is still pending both in and out of court. The farmer members who objected to the Socialist attitude of Scholtz and McKaig, heads of the organization in Idaho, and to the anarchistic utterances in their newspaper, the official organ of the league, defending Debs and mitigating the use of bombs, also object to the importation from North Dakota of Mr. Hall to run the league's affairs. Several of them, representing quite a body of farmers, have signed a statement directed to the state committee of the league as follows:

First—Why the state committee holds no meetings, and seemingly takes no interest in the welfare of the organization?

Second—Why, if this is, as we were informed when we signed up with the league, a democratic organization and if the league believes in the people ruling, was it necessary to import a man from North Dakota to act as the state manager without consulting the members of the party?

Third—Do you believe you are doing your duty to your fellow members when you allow such high-handed proceedings, either with or without your consent? Do you look upon the members as merely dumb cattle that must go wherever the leader says?

Fourth—If you cannot act on this board why not resign and let the people select men who will take an interest?
