Death of A. H. Heath.

Albert H. Heath, a veteran of the civil war, died at the home of Joseph Kauffman in Orofino last Friday the 6th instant, and was buried Sunday afternoon, Rev. J. H. Hart conducting the funeral services at the M. E. church. Deceased was born in the state of Maine, March 10, 1822. Mr. Heath came west and settled in Minnesota where he lived until after the civil war, serving in Co. A, 8th Minn. Infantry during the war. After the war he moved to Oregon and took up a homestead in the Santiam country where he lived for a number of years and from there he moved to the Palouse country. For the last fifteen years he has lived with his son-in-law Joseph Kauffman, county auditor of this county. The deceased leaves four daughters, Mrs. Joseph Kauffman, Mrs. Walter Leachman and Mrs. Pearl J. Heath of Orofino, and Mrs. N. C. Bicknell of Natchez, Washington.
