Bulletin on Vinegar.

It is against the laws of the state of Idaho to sell vinegar from any cask or keg, unless the said cask or keg is branded or stenciled on the head with the true name of the vinegar, name of the article or articles from which it is made, and the name and address of the manufacturer. The placing of a printed label on the cask or keg is neither branding nor stenciling. Dealers should see that the head of the cask or keg containing this information is on top, exposed to the view of the consumer, for whose benefit this information is required by law.

All dealers should get guarantees from the wholesaler, jobber or manufacturer, that vinegars they buy comply with the pure food laws of Idaho. We have lately been clearing off the market a lot of distilled vinegar, colored to imitate the cider vinegar. Idaho farmers who are manufacturing a good, pure, cider vinegar from their apples are going to be protected from this spurious stuff, and notice is therefore given to all interested, that the laws of Idaho deems a product adulterated if it is mixed, colored or stained in a manner whereby damage or inferiority is concealed. In our opinion the addition of coloring matter to any type of vinegar is for the sole purpose of concealing inferiority and deceiving the public, and is therefore prohibited.

Bulletin on undrawn Poultry.

The sale of undrawn poultry (i. e., poultry containing the entrails or intestines) is forbidden under the food laws of Idaho, which prohibit the sale of "Any part of an animal unfit for food." The following sections of the law cover the same as construed by this Department:

"An article of food shall be deemed adulterated if it consists in whole or in part of a diseased, filthy, decomposed, infected, tainted, putrid or rotten animal or vegetable substance or substances: OR ANY PART OR PORTION

OF AN ANIMAL DISEASED OR OTHERWISE UNFIT FOR FOOD."

"It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, corporation or corporations to sell or offer for sale the meat of any cattle, sheep, swine, fish, GAME, FOWL OR POULTRY which is blown, tainted, heated, soured, raised, stuffed, putrid or impure, or which, for other reasons, is unfit for human food."

The possession of any food, the sale of which is forbidden by law, is prima facie evidence that it is for sale.

This bulletin is mailed to dealers so that they may not violate the law. Prosecutions will be instituted against any and all persons found so doing.
