FOREST SERVICE EXAMINATION

The United States Civil Service Commission announces that a forest and field clerk examination will be held in this city on January 25, 1919, to fill vacancies in the position of forest clerk, forest service, and clerk in the reclamation and other field branches of the Government service in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Alaska. The entrance salary for the position of forest clerk is \$1,100 or \$1,200 a year; for the position of clerk in the reclamation and other services \$1,100 to \$1,600 a year. Age limits for forest clerk, 18 to 40 years; for field clerk 18 years or over. Any further information will be furnished by David Laing, of this city.

United States Department of Agriculture FOREST SERVICE CHALLIS NATIONAL FOREST

Notice to Stockmen:

Applications for grazing permits on the Challis National Forest for the season of 1919 must be on file at the Forest Office, Challis, Idaho, on or before February 15, 1919.

AUTHORIZATIONS: The Secretary of Agriculture has authorized the grazing of 93,000 head of sheep and 9,000 head of cattle and horses on the Challis National Forest during the season of 1919.

The grazing periods and fees established are as follows:

Cattle and horses: Yearlong, beginning May 1, cattle \$1.00, horses \$1.25.
May 1 to November 15,..... cattle .65, horses .81.
June 1 to November 15,..... cattle .55, horses .69.

Sheep: Yearlong, beginning May 1,.....25c.
July 1 to September 15,..... 7c.
June 16 to October 15,.....10c.
Ewes to lamb, additional..... 2c.

The old protective and maximum limits will remain in effect as follows: Cattle and horses, protective limit, 150; maximum limit, 500. Sheep and goats, protective limit, 1500; maximum limit, 8,000. Idaho State limit on sheep, 16,000.

Where Challis and Salmon interforest permits are issued by this office the Salmon protective limit of 75 head of cattle will govern.

QUALIFICATIONS: New applicants and those wishing to graze increased numbers, to qualify for permits or increases must own and reside upon ranch property which is dependent on the use of the range, winter their stock on the product of the ranch, and not own more than the protective limit. After those with the above qualifications have been provided for and there is still surplus range, temporary permits will be issued to those coming the closest to the above qualifications.

Grazing fees must be paid 30 days before the opening of the grazing season.

Salting instructions of the Forest officers must be followed.

Damage done by stock to Forest Service roads, trails or other improvements must be repaired at the expense of the stock owners.

Sheep must not be allowed to bed more than three nights in one place unless a longer use of a bed ground is authorized by the Ranger in charge.

The owners of animals which die on the Forest from contagious or infectious diseases must burn the carcass. Animals which die in the close vicinity of water must be removed and buried or burned.

Failure to follow the above instructions will result in reduction or revocation of grazing privileges.

The Idaho State bull law which requires one registered bull for every 25 head of breeding cows became effective September 8, 1918. Beginning with the 1919 season the Forest Service will enforce this law on all National Forest ranges.

Applications for grazing permits must be filed with the Forest Supervisor, Challis, Idaho, on or before February 15, 1919, or they will not be considered.

Applications must be filled out in detail on both sides and signed.

Application blank is enclosed. Further information will be gladly furnished on request.

TERMS OF DIS- TRICT COURT

In The District Court of The Sixth Judicial District of the State of Idaho.

Under and by virtue of the authority in me vested by the statutes of Idaho, I hereby fix the terms of court for the Sixth Judicial District of the State of Idaho, for the year 1919, to commence and be held in the counties of said District, as follows, to-wit:

Bingham County: February 3rd; May 19th; November 3rd.

Butte County: January 20th; September 8th.

Custer County: April 7th; September 23rd.

Lemhi County: March 25th; October 8th.

Said terms of court to convene at ten o'clock a. m., on the days above designated.

It is further ordered: That this order be filed and entered of record by the clerks of said court in each county of said district, and that the same be published two consecutive weeks in a newspaper published in their respective counties.

ORDER

In the District Court of the Sixth Judicial District, of the State of Idaho, in and for the County of Custer.

In the matter of the October, 1918, term of the District Court in and for said County.

The Judge of this Court, having heretofore, during the month of October, 1918, made an order postponing the regular October, 1918, term called to sit on the 21 day of October, until the 9th day of December, 1918, and having thereafter made a further adjournment of said term until the 15th day of December, both of such adjournments having been made on account of the prevalence of an epidemic of influenza in the County of Custer, Idaho; And it now appearing to the Judge of the said Court that such epidemic has not entirely abated, and that certain quarantine regulations exist in the said county, making it difficult for parties litigant to attend at the county seat of said county;

And, further, that it is difficult for the officers or said Court to obtain accommodations at Challis, county seat of said county, while attending the said Court;

It is, therefore, ordered that a further postponement of said term of Court be made until the next regular term of Court there in to be held for the year 1919; and all causes now on the calendar of said Court, which might, or could be, heard during such

term are continued until the next regular term of said Court.
