While there are many new subscriptions the list shows that a number who had already subscribed have taken additional bonds. The precinct must raise \$1350 more by close of banking hours Oct. 19 to reach its quota of \$26,000. Committees have been busy throughout the precinct all week.

The complete revised alphabetical list of all subscribers in the precinct, showing the total each has subscribed, will be published in a subsequent issue of THE TRIBUNE.

A list of subscribers outside of Rathdrum precinct, who have subscribed through the Rathdrum State bank, will also be published later.

Reports yesterday morning showed that Idaho stood second in the 12th federal reserve district with 84 per cent of its fourth Liberty loan quota subscribed. Oregon was first with 98 per cent. The percentage for the nation was under 60, with but three days in which to raise the remaining 40 per cent.

DIED AT GENESEE, IDAHO

Funeral of Earl E. Hay Held at Rathdrum.

Earl E. Hay, formerly of Rathdrum vicinity, but more recently employed in the implement business at Genesee, died of typhoid fever in the hospital there last Saturday, Oct. 12. The body was brought to Rathdrum and the funeral held from Stone's undertaking rooms Monday afternoon at 2:30, a beautiful open air service preceding interment in Pine Grove cemetery. Rev. J. G. Carrick officiated at the services which were closed with prayer by Rev. Milton Schweitzer. Among the immediate relatives and friends present at the funeral from out of town were Mr. and Mrs. S. P. Hay and son, Roy, of Spokane, Wash., Glen W. Hay of Portland, Ore., Mr. and Mrs. N. D. Sage of Spokane, and Hugh R. Sage of Plains, Mont.

Earl Edward Hay was born at Mings, Iowa, Aug. 18, 1889, died Oct. 12, 1918, aged 29 years and nearly two months. He moved to Spokane, Wash., in 1903, and was married Jan. 26, 1915, to Cora A. Sage of Rathdrum. He leaves his widow and son; also, his father and mother. Mr. and Mrs. S. P. Hay, and two brothers, Glenn W. and Roy C. Hay.

He was united in early life with the M. E. church and afterwards joined the Christian church.
