Notice was received this week by Ernest Reiniger, local food representative, that all sugar restrictions have been removed by the food administration.

After one week of freedom from restrictions, the influenza emergency ordinance in Rathdrum was put back into force again last Saturday evening, restoring the ban on church services, lodge meetings and public gatherings in general. The action was taken because of the sudden appearance of eight or ten new cases of influenza in the neighborhood.

United States Senate.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 29, 1918.

I do not know, Mrs. Libby, just what can be done about it as I have only received your letter today and have not had time to consult the Secretary of War to see if your plans could be carried out. But I shall do so and if it can be done I shall be glad to help bring it about.
