Not Killed In Action.

The report in Wednesday's official casualty list, that Private Joseph Cossetti, Rathdrum, Idaho, was killed in action, is an error according to friends here, who have received two letters from Joseph Cossetti of Rathdrum since hostilities ceased. In these letters he said he planned to visit his family in Italy before returning to America. It is presumed a man of the same name was killed in action and that in looking up the record the official compilers made an error.

Cossetti was an Idaho section hand at Rathdrum. He joined Company C, 2nd Idaho, at Camp Alene in 1917, that organization being afterwards merged with the 146th Field artillery.

Another Missing Soldier Found.

Word has been received by Frank Feoreto from Leonardo DeLuca stating that he was in a hospital at a camp in New Jersey recovering from being gassed while serving at the front in France. He was reported a month ago as missing in action.
