GERMANY succeeded in destroying the industrial plants of France and Belgium during the war, thus removing two commercial competitors for several years to come. With the help of the bolsheviks, she crippled Russia in like manner. But the end of the war leaves Germany with her own factories intact. Yet that nation protests at the penalties for wrongdoing. Instead of demurring to the peace terms, severe though they may be, it would seem that Germany should find some consolation in the fact that the treaty does not require her to replace with her own the factories she destroyed for her commercial rivals.

THE festive squirrel is to be assailed more relentlessly than ever. Centenary Plans Are Outlined.

Portland, Ore.—(Methodist Centenary Publicity Service.)—

The church in America intends to take its place in the forefront. From now on, its motto will be "doing," not talking.

Hence, in celebration of the 100th anniversary of the foundation of Christian missions, the Methodist Episcopal church and the Methodist Episcopal church, south, have joined in a nationwide Methodist centenary campaign.

Every phase of Methodist church life has been enlisted. The aim of the colossal campaign is the rebuilding of the world.

\$140,000,000 to Be Raised.

In brief, the Methodist Episcopal churches of both branches will ask for a total of \$140,000,000 for their joint aims. Especially detailed are those aims so far as they concern the Methodist Episcopal church, which in the seven-day period of May 18-25 will ask for \$105,000,000.

Here is how that money will be spent:

Forty million dollars on the greatest foreign mission programme ever conceived, lasting five years; embracing the building and operating of schools, hospitals, dispensaries, colleges and everything that will benefit mankind. Christianity will be preached too, but the aim of this new and bigger Methodism is to live Christianity and the brotherhood of man.

\$40,000,000 at Home.

Sanitary Inspector Coming.

Boise, Idaho, May 12.—Excuses arising from war time exigencies having become unacceptable, prosecutions for violations of the state sanitary laws will be based entirely upon conditions as they exist at the time inspections are completed, according to a recent announcement made by J. K. White, commissioner of public welfare.

"It has been brought to my attention," said Commissioner White Saturday, "that inspectors of this department are making an unusual number of prosecutions based principally upon the maintenance of public nuisances within city and village limits and upon unsanitary conditions in and about places of business which come under our jurisdiction.

It is not the policy of this department to conduct a campaign of prosecution, but it must be generally understood that these inspectors will take conditions as they find them at the time of the inspection. If conditions are discovered to be in violation of the general principals of decency and the rules of sanitation, legal action necessarily must be taken.

"In the recent past, much was overlooked because of the scarcity of labor, but this is no longer an excuse and inspectors have instructions to accept no excuse whatever for dirty, filthy, insanitary conditions in public places.

"It is hoped that our city officials and the various newspapers will cause this information to be given to the public that full knowledge may be had of the policy and plan of work of this department that all concerned may protect themselves from prosecutions sure to follow if insanitary conditions are found by inspectors."

Centenary Movement Boosted.

Rathdrum Community M. E. church is reported to have subscribed its quota of \$1025 a year for the five-year Methodist centenary movement. Of the amount, \$117 is to be raised by the Sunday school and \$57 by the Epworth League. The balance is made up of individual subscriptions of \$1 to \$50 a year each.

Over \$500 was subscribed last Friday evening when Spokane speakers and singers gave the movement a boost. A large crowd attended the meeting, which opened with singing led by N. H. Taylor, Miss Fere Carrick playing the accompaniment. M. B. Layton introduced G. C. Baldwin of Spokane, who took charge of the meeting. Others who spoke were Mark W. Egbers of Rathdrum and Ed Jocklin of Spokane. Music was furnished by the Spokane quartet, and the meeting closed with the serving of ice cream and cake.

BRILLIANT PREACHER IS CENTENARY LEADER

As executive secretary, he supervises the business details of the vast Centenary plans in the Portland area, which consists of the state of Washington, a large part of the state of Oregon and northern Idaho.

calls for living Christianity and doing Christian things, rather than preaching Methodism. Great community churches in the big cities where there will be healthy amusements and where the church buildings will be open seven days a week; community churches in the country—\$11,000,000 alone will be spent on helping to make the country church a real factor, building cross roads churches, making allowances so that the rural church can get the best of pastors and pay them a salary that will interest them; educational work in the cities; help pastors to get a living wage.

Twenty-five million dollars will be expended in the next five years at the rate of \$5,000,000 on direct war reconstruction work equally divided between Europe and this country. Close on \$3,000,000 has already been spent by the sending to Europe of the first Methodist mission ship. Perhaps there were Bibles on board, but there were a great many more plows and tractors. That great ship was loaded to the gunwales with everything that could help a people to rebuild.

United Church is Aim.

Methodism is preaching a united church—a common church. It is urging that churches unite, the smaller churches closing that the stronger ones may be stronger yet.

"Let us have a strong, dominant Christianity," say the Methodist leaders. "Never mind about the especial brand.

"With Christianity and the golden rule ruling the world, peace, democracy and Christianity will be unitedly safe forever."
