City of Caldwell is to spend this year in paving two of the residence streets of the town permanent material.

The State Horticultural society, meeting at Boise, adopted the States bureau of markets grade stations for boxed apples.

People of Pashmaroi valley are petitioning the legislature for an enabling act to permit the Custer county part valley to annex itself to Lemhi county.

Young men's club has been organized in Boise, between 25 and 30 couples members. It is planned to hold meetings every two weeks through the month.

Estimated total of \$2,151,025 was appropriated for the state of Idaho through active agricultural extension department of the University of Idaho last year.

Appropriation of \$40,000 for erection of the federal building and court house at Boise is carried in the public building bill, reported by the House of Representatives.

Posters have received instructions regarding soldiers' mail over the name of the town is put on the letter if the postage is 5 cents.

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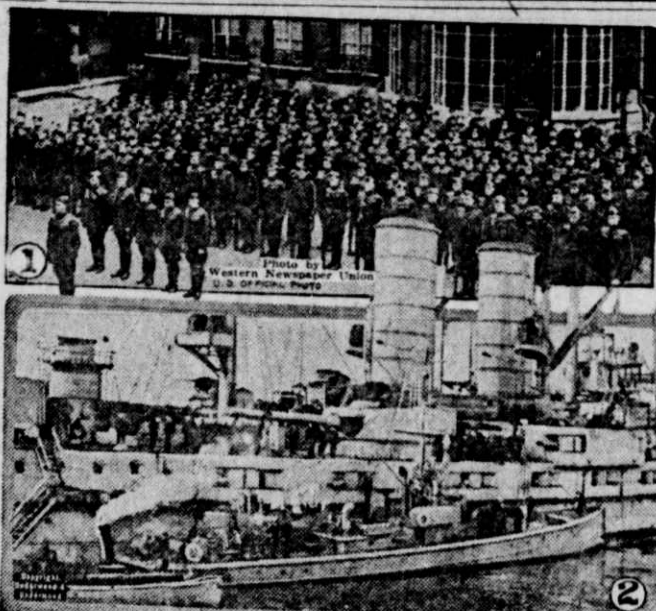

NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS

President Wilson Bringing Back Completed Draft of League of Nations Plan.

SEVERER ARMISTICE TERMS

Arrogant Huns to Be Made to Realize They Were Whipped—Ebert Elected President of the German Republic—Revolt Against the King of Roumania.

President Wilson is bringing home with him the virtually complete draft of the constitution of the League of Nations that is to ally if not to end most of the world's ills.

As it stands, the plan provides for a small body of representatives of all the nations concerned, which shall meet every few months in a place to be internationalized.

France, which, since the outbreak of the great war, justly considers herself an outpost nation guarding a frontier of civilization, strongly urged the creation of an immediate international army and navy to enforce the rulings of the society of nations.

It is scarcely conceivable that this solution of the question can be satisfactory to France. The great war demonstrated that in a sudden shock attack a nation can suffer immense damage before her allies can mobilize their forces and transport them to the scene of conflict.

Having adopted a constitution and elected Friedrich Ebert as president of the German republic, the Germans in their national assembly at Weimar became more arrogant than ever.

their national assembly at Weimar became more arrogant than ever. Their attitude was accurately reflected by Ebert who, in his speech accepting the office, said: "We shall combat domination by force to the utmost, from whatever direction it may come."

Matthias Erzberger, before meeting the entente chiefs to negotiate an extension of the armistice, conferred with officials in Berlin, and it was said they determined that he should demand that the allies recognize the new German government.

All this, and the fact that the enemy countries were preserving enough war material to permit them to equip quickly an army of 3,000,000 men, had full effect on the supreme war council when it decided on conditions of renewal of the armistice.

According to reliable information, the armistice is renewed for a very brief time, the allies reserving the right to suspend it if Germany fails to carry out the new clauses, which include the cessation of hostilities against the Poles.

The firm attitude of the supreme war council possibly was due in some measure to an impressive speech by Premier Clemenceau, in which he showed the council the necessity of taking all precautions against the treacherous Huns.

If Germany submits and acts in apparent good faith, it is likely some economic measures will be adopted that would facilitate the resumption of her peace activities to a considerable extent.

Among the interesting developments of the week was the dispute between China and Japan, relating to the disposition of Shantung province and Tsingtao and in general the concessions which China had been forced to grant to Germany.

The Japanese threw another small monkeywrench into the machinery by the flat statement that they intended to hang onto the Caroline and Marshall Islands, which they took from Germany, notwithstanding the expressed will of the peace conference that all the captured colonies should be governed by mandates of the League of Nations.

The prospects of the proposed meeting of Russian factions and advisers from the allied nations at Prinkipo are growing better.

set up independent republics and are no longer parts of Russia. The admission of representatives of the soviet government is conditional on its cessation of hostilities.

An attempt to put the skids under another king, which may be successful, was started last week in Roumania.

In the United States the anarchists, whose machinations were largely responsible for the strikes on the Pacific coast and in Montana and Arizona, sustained a hard blow from the government.

The administration's big navy bill, bolstered by a semi-secret cablegram from President Wilson to the house naval committee, had a stormy time in the house last week.

Secretary Baker and Chairman Dent have drawn up an army bill, now before the house, providing for a temporary army of something over half a million, to be raised by voluntary enlistments and designed only to carry the country over the period of occupation and reorganization.

Once more the suffragists put their cause to the test in the senate, and once more they went down to defeat, this time by a margin of only one vote.

MINES AND MINING

Mining operations in and around the famous old Nevada camp of Goldfield are active this winter.

According to a statement from the United States geological survey, under the head, "Crisis in the American Potash Industry," Utah is the only state treating alunite ores.

During the past week the Wasatch Mines new drain, development and transportation tunnel reached a point about 3500 feet in from the portal.

Drifting has been discontinued for the present in the Red Hill Florence at Goldfield, and a winze is being sunk from the drift on the 600-foot level in which the discovery of rich ore was made recently.

Hundreds of Greeks, Serbians and Italians in Helper, Price, Hiawatha and other mining towns in southern Utah are being fleeced of war savings stamps and Liberty bonds by salesmen for wildcat oil companies, it is charged.

Stockholders of the Albion, Mineral Flat and Alta-Germania mining companies met in special meetings at Salt Lake and unanimously voted in favor of the consolidation of their extensive united domains in Alta and American Fork districts.

The representatives of the Copper Export association, who sailed from this side on January 25 to study possibilities for the early renewal of the European export business in copper, have arrived in London, says the Boston News Bureau.

One carload of what is called the "semisulphide" ores of the Alta Consolidated was put through the sampler the past week, and showed gross values of about \$45 a ton.

From the Iowa-Copper comes the encouraging news from Manager Dave Scott that small pockets of high-grade copper ore is being found in the drift from the shaft, and water coming in at the face indicating that the contact is being reached, says the Park City (Utah) Record.

One of the biggest acreages of mineral territory incorporated in the Tintic district in years will be taken in by the Tintic Paymaster Mines company. It will embrace in the northwest part of the district 640 acres, while added to this there are options on 54 additional claims.

According to a story from Boston, for the last few months earnings of American Smelting & Refining company have been affected adversely not only by the dullness in copper market conditions, but by similar conditions existing in the lead situation in which the company leads.

The mill at the Ingalls mine in Tule canyon has been operating successfully for the past two weeks, treating from sixteen to seventeen tons of ore a day and making a recovery that is highly satisfactory, following a period of several weeks devoted to trial runs, says the Tonopah (Nev.) Times.

Reports have come up the past week from Beaver county that Supt. Graff of the Paloma has encountered some good values in a south drift on the 300-foot level.

At a distance of over 300 feet from the main shaft the east drift in the Jumbo Copper mountain mine at Goldfield has entered one of the cross fissures in which the ore is found and assays as high as 30 per cent copper have been obtained recently, with indications that the present work will lead to the opening of a large ore body.

According to the Transvaal chamber of mines, the output from the Witwatersrand district during December, 1918, (in fine gold), amounted to 630,505 ounces, as against 640,797 for November and 687,127 ounces for the corresponding month of 1917.

Decision to throw upon the market surplus stocks of copper, brass and lead held by the war department has been reached, it was announced February 17, at meetings held at Washington between officials of the director of sales office, representatives of the lead and copper industries and of the geological survey.

Statistics have been presented before a congressional committee, showing that 62 per cent of miners employed in this country are of foreign birth, and that many thousands of them cannot read safety instructions or understand directions spoken in English.

California's direct contribution in winning the war by shipping its refined oil products during 1918 to the Atlantic coast, as expressed in gallons, is 31,326,000 gallons of naphtha products and 29,300,000 gallons of lubricating oils, shipped to meet government requirements on the eastern coast.
