The levy for state and county purposes completed by the board of county commissioners is 13.4 mills as against 11 mills last year. The increase is due to larger demands from the state and the new law which has required raising \$15 per capita for the school children of the county. The state is asking this year in round numbers \$28,000 as against \$20,000 for 1916. The county current expense fund is less than last year but the increase of the county general school fund will bring the money to be raised for county purposes about the same as for 1916. The assessed value of the county is approximately \$12,000,000.

The principal reason that Cottonwood is the most substantial and prosperous town (for its size) in the United States is because it is surrounded by the richest farming country in the U. S. and is the trading point for more than a thousand of the most energetic, successful and prosperous farmers and stockmen to be found in the entire country. Wherever you find farmers and stockmen prosperous, everybody else is prosperous also.

F. S. Wimer this week sold the Cottonwood Chronicle to S. P. Shutt, of Joseph, Ore. Brother Wimer is one of our most highly esteemed contemporaries and a good newspaper man, but he is going back to the soil—400 acres of it—and we don't blame him. If we had half that much we'd follow suit. We extend the welcome hand to Brother Shutt.—Nepzer Herald.
