COUNTY SEAT NEWS ITEMS

Deputy State Game Warden Don Fisher is having offices in the First National Bank building fitted up and will soon be ready to transact the business of his office there. The rooms are located upstairs next to the offices of Attorney E. M. Griffith.

It is believed the persons who entered the store wanted money. No money had been left in the cash register so their plans were thwarted.

Thomas Jordan who left Grangeville a few weeks ago for his former home at Pine Creek, Alta., where he intended to reside, died March 4, several days after he arrived in Canada. Mr. Jordan resided in Grangeville for a year. He was the father of Mrs. Fred Erskine of this city.

Recent dispatches in the Boise papers state that friends of Evan Evans are making a strong demand on Governor D. W. Davis for his appointment to the post of immigration, labor and statistics commissioner under the new administration bill. Mr. Evans is now visiting with his daughters at Los Angeles.

The St. Patrick's dance given for the benefit and in honor of the returned soldiers Monday night was well attended. Several parties from Cottonwood came over and a large crowd was represented. The Cowboy orchestra furnished the music for the occasion.

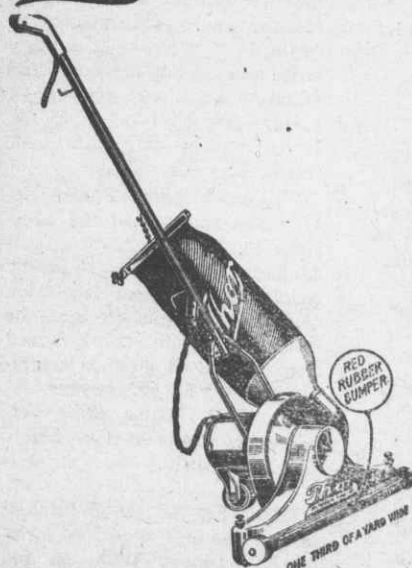
