ITEMS FROM ALL SECTIONS OF THE COUNTRY.

A Brief Summary of the News Compiled for Our Readers.

For posting properties in this manner and ad-

vertising them in the Idaho Mining News for sixty days the fee of \$5.00 will be charged members of the Exchange, and \$25.00 will be charged non-members to cover clerical expenses, to be forwarded with report; it will be returned if application is rejected. Copies of the reports and maps will be forwarded at the uniform price of \$2.50 for the report and \$2.20 for the maps, payable in advance. Notice is hereby given that the Governor of the State of Idaho has made application at the United States Surveyor General's office at Boise city, Idaho, dated January 4, 1896, for the survey of 15 townships of the public lands situated within the State of Idaho, under the provisions of the Act of Congress of August 18, 1894, for the purpose of satisfying the public land grants made to said State by the act of July 3, 1890, admitting Idaho into the Union. Said townships within the Hailey Land District, are as follows: Township 7 South, Range 19 East. Township 9 South, Range 19 East. Township 10 South, Range 19 East. The lands embraced in the approximate full and fractional townships above named, are reserved from any adverse appropriation by settlement or otherwise (except under rights that may be found to exist of prior insection), from and after the date of filing of the application for survey--Jan. 4 1896--and for a period extending from January 4, 1896, until the expiration of sixty days from the date of filing the official plats of survey of the above named townships in this office, during which period the State authorities may select any of the lands situated in said townships which are not embraced in any valid adverse claim.
