A Brief Summary of the News Compiled for Our Readers.

Cuba is still ahead of the game

Edward Patridge, the great "bear" of the Chicago Board of Trade, is dead.

Kate Durkee of Omaha says that she was not killed by Holmes or any one else.

Bradley received Kentucky's instructions, but McKinley was named as second choice.

Senator Hill is in favor of sending an uninstructed delegation from New York to Chicago.

St. Louis has been selected at the meeting place of the national convention of democratic league clubs.

Mr. Bland has consented to accept the indorsement of the Sedalia convention as a Presidential candidate.

The appropriations passed and contemplated for this session of Congress aggregate over a half billion dollars.

A summary of the last week shows that the republicans have elected 608 delegates, 318 of them are for McKinley.

Reed is said to have concluded that his presidential chances have vanished and is becoming correspondingly sour.

Ex-Confederate veterans and Daughters of the confederacy are raising a fund for the erection of a confederate Battle Abbey.

An equestrian statue of Gen. Grant in Brooklyn has been unveiled.

The most skeptical Senator now says that Congress will adjourn about June 1.

Odd Fellows celebrated their 77 anniversary through out the country Monday.

The Oklahoma statehood bill is not expected to pass until the next Congress.

The Pennsylvania republican convention presented Senator Matt Quay as a presidential candidate.

It is now estimated that the National Treasury deficiency will amount to \$25,000,000 for this year.

Queen Victoria has established another order of knighthood, and Alfred Austin is to be premier knight.

Ex-Governor Russell's boom for the presidential nomination is looked on with amusement at Washington.

The program in the house from now on, all the appropriation bills having been passed, will consist chiefly of political speeches.

Seven hundred Cuban insurgents met 800 Spanish troops on April 17th. The fight lasted an hour. The Spanish lost a Captain, two Sergeants and 42 soldiers killed, and 90 wounded. The insurgent loss was 20 killed and 32 wounded.
