HEALTH ALMANAC

One of the almanacs of the 19th century bore the following title "Pronostication of Mayster John Thybault, medycynne and astronomer of the Emperyal Majesty, of the year of our Lorde God MCCCCXXXII, comprehending the III partes of this yere, and of the influence of the moone of peas and warre, and of the syknesses of this yere, with the constellations of them that be under the vij planetes, and the revolutions of Kynges and princes, and of the eclipyses and comets."

We are still prognosticating on the subject of "peas and warre, and the revolutions of Kynges and princes, but the United States Public Health Service in its Health Almanac for 1919 is not content with chronicling our various ills, but preaches prevention of the "syknesses of this yere."

In addition to the monthly calendar of health hints and notable events this almanac discusses such topics as the following: Control and prevention of infectious diseases, as pneumonia, common colds, tuberculosis, infantile paralysis, typhoid fever, smallpox, trachoma, hookworm disease, and venereal diseases. Disposal of human excreta. Importance of clean drinking water. Care of the teeth. Care of milk in the home. What the U. S. public health service is doing to protect the health of the people of the United States.

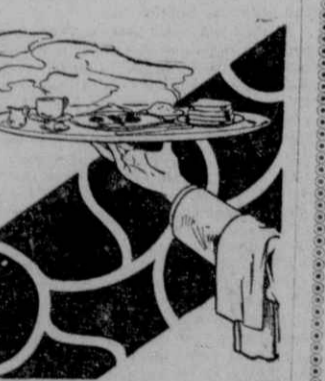

COYOTE HIDES OF GREAT VALUE FOR FURS

If the ranchers and sheep growers had their wish there would be 20 coyotes in North America. The ranchers and sheep-growers think the only thing coyotes were made for is to kill cattle and sheep. This is a wrong impression. The coyotes must have some other calling in life or the Good Book "missed fire" when it said nothing was in vain.

"My opinion of it," says A. B. Shulbert, president of the largest house in the world dealing exclusively in American raw furs, "is that the coyote is here to give up the ghost and surrender his pelt to the furrier who by the way makes good use of the better coyote pelt but has little use for the poor ones. The better grades of coyote pelts are being dressed and dyed and used in imitation of fox and on account of great popularity of the animal scarf coyotes are in strong demand and are bringing the highest prices ever known. The coyote is the only furbearer that can be used in imitation of fox.

The poorer grades of coyote are being used for coat linings, lap robes, and the like. The skin is large and requires but little work—it answers the purpose.

A soft, silky coyote, dressed and dyed and made into an animal scarf can hardly be distinguished from a fox, except by an expert, so trappers are asked to get after the coyote and trap as many as they can as the present high price on this article will pay well for time and efforts.
