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The political situation in Idaho is certainly in a turmoil. No one seems able to judge with any degree of accuracy what effect the non-partisan element will have on the fortunes of either of the old parties. While the democrats have only three candidates on the state ticket who are not non-partisan league members, they are still intensely interested in the election of these three. All democrats can conscientiously vote for Nugent, Moore and Parker but the rest of the ticket belongs in the camp of the non-partisan league and will be scratched by all good democrats.

There are fully as many republicans who are members of the league in Idaho as there are democrats. The republican members of course will vote for Samuels for governor, thus decreasing the republican majority. The only hope of electing a republican governor lies in the probability that a large majority of democrats will vote for Davis. That the league is stronger in Idaho than most of us like to believe, is a matter that will hardly admit of argument. If the members of both parties do not pool their issues it will simply mean that the governor and legislative ticket of the league will win and Idaho will be placed in the Bolshevik class, a condition that no loyal American citizen can think of with any degree of comfort.

In the county the only danger from the league element is in the legislative ticket, consisting of the state senator and three representatives on the democratic ticket.

One of the important constitutional amendments to be voted upon at the general election next Tuesday is the third amendment as printed upon the ballot which will decide the fate of the office of State Superintendent of Public Instruction. This office is duplicated in the Commissioner of Education, is a needless expense to the state and should be voted upon accordingly. The present incumbent, Miss Redfield, favors the abolishment of the office and the voters of the state can do no less than complete the formality of doing away with a useless and expensive office.

There never has been an election when it has been more desirable that the voters should be thoroughly familiar with the candidates on the ticket, then the general election to be held next Tuesday. Particularly in the county, party lines should be forgotten among democrats and republicans, and the best man on either ticket elected. If the candidate is the right kind of a man it matters little whether he is a democrat or a republican. During these unsettled times the county and state need men upon whom the people can rely and it is the duty of every voter to see that men of this stamp are given the proper support at the polls.

President Wilson counters on Roosevelt and Lodge by republishing appeals made by them for the people to elect a republican congress in 1898 to "back up President McKinley and show the old world that the people indorse his attitude in the war and have confidence in him." Honors, in this wordy battle seem to be about even.—Star-Mirror.

Idaho soldiers will not lose their vote at the general election November 5. They will have to vote through the mails and its a pretty safe bet there won't be any non-partisan league ballots cast by them.

Article 1 of the constitutional amendments which you will have an opportunity to vote upon at the general election Tuesday, is a very important matter and should not be passed over without due consideration by the voter. Whether the constitution needs revising or not isn't of so much importance as

whether this is the proper time to revise the constitution. The constitution has served its purpose for a number of years and it can continue to do so until after the war. There will be plenty of time then to look after such matters of legislation. If you vote "No" after this amendment you can't go far wrong.
