FRENCH PEOPLE TAKING GOOD CARE OF FINAL RESTING PLACES OF U. S. BOYS.

IDENTITY DISC ON CROSS

Helmets Often Placed Nearby and Foot Is Marked by Bayonet of Departed Soldier.

After the war Americans will have no difficulty in finding the graves of relatives who have fallen on the field of battle in France, after they obtain from the Graves Registry Bureau the location of the interment, writes a correspondent from France.

The French are taking excellent care of the last resting places of Americans, and crosses with name plates have been erected over the burial places of every identified man who has fallen.

Usually the steel helmet of the man—and it generally has his name written on the leather chinband—is placed on the grave, together with his bayonet, thrust into the earth as a sort of footstone. Often his canteen and cartridge belt will be hung from the cross.

An identity disc is nailed to the cross, and sometimes papers describing his identity and how he fell are placed in a corked bottle, the neck of which is embedded in the earth.

There is no danger that French civilians in the regions where the men are buried will appropriate any of these articles as souvenirs. Four long years of war, with the discarded equipment of Germans, British and French scattered over the terrain has purged them of all desire or longing for souvenirs.

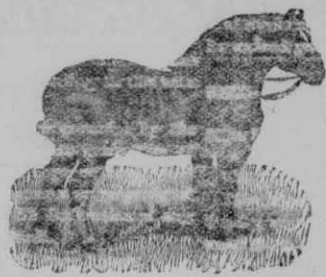
