

LEAD OFFICES OF PIN BOAD MOVED TO WEISER

RAIN SCHEDULE CHANGED ON LINE EXTENDING TO NEW MEADOWS

REASONS FOR THE TRANSFER

Protests Are Filed But Public Utilities Commission Authorizes New Schedule

Offices and shops of the Pacific & Idaho Northern railway are to be moved from New Meadows, where they were established when the road was built, to Weiser. Permission to make a change has been granted by the public utilities commission. New Meadows is the northern terminal of the road, and Weiser is at the south end, where the road joins the Oregon Short line.

Passenger schedules have been re-arranged so that the passenger train leaves Weiser in the morning and returns in the afternoon, the present schedule being the reverse with New Meadows as the terminus. The new schedule coming effective December 8.

In support of its petition the company urged the following: As an economy in operating expenses, it being necessary at present to carry fuel and supplies to the end of the branch; difficulty in securing and keeping employees because of living conditions and social attractions in New Meadows being inferior in some respects to those of Weiser; convenience to the traveling public, commercial travelers especially, in making the change; better mail facilities for most of the road's patrons, the claim being made that most of them would receive their mail five hours earlier.

Protests were made against the petition by citizens of New Meadows who objected to inconveniences that would result in their mail facilities and the

financial loss that would result to persons who established business enterprises on the representations of the officials and stockholders of the company that the headquarters would be maintained at New Meadows and trains operated from the town.

SHORT COURSE IN FORESTRY.

The date of opening the short course in forestry at the University of Idaho, postponed from November 4 on account of the influenza epidemic, has now been definitely fixed as January 1, and the course will continue twelve weeks. This course is planned to meet the needs of forest rangers and guards; also of woodland owners and others engaged in some branch of the lumber industry, who wish to acquire a knowledge of the general principles of forestry. It prepares for the civil service examination for forest ranger in the U. S. forest service. Admission is without examination, and anyone may attend who has the equivalent of eighth grade preparation. The work is intensely practical, and is given by lectures, in the laboratory, and by actual field demonstrations. A special effort will be made to adapt the course to meet the requirements of returned soldiers, wishing to take advantage of it. N-P LEAGUE FAVORS UNITED STATES OF WORLD

SOCIALISTIC PROGRAM OF GOVERNMENT ADVOCATED AT ST. PAUL MEETING.

DEMAND WORK, CHEAP LIVING

Insist Unemployed Should Be Given Jobs on Public Works—Ask 'Rights' be Restored

The National Non-partisan league, in secret convention, recently, in St. Paul, demanded a peace which would create a "united states of the world, by consent and not by conquest."

The league's program, as given to the press last Thursday night, is as follows:

"First—A peace program ending war by creating world democracy, not substituting one despotism for another. A united states of the world, by consent and not by conquest.

Want Work For Everyone.

"Second—A reconstruction program providing for the employment of all, reduction of the cost of living, ending monopolistic extortion, and redeeming the state and national governments from autocratic control of monopolies, and in this way making the world safe for democracy.

"Third—The termination of the present national control of railways, and all other public utilities and industries taken over as war measures, not by return of these properties to private monopolies, but by national ownership.

"Fourth—Employment of the unemployed, in co-operation with organized labor, through government works in such enterprises as road building, forestry, timber and fuel production, flood protection, and land reclamation.

Votes For All Women.

"Fifth—Complete enfranchisement of women with equal opportunities with

men and equal pay for equal service. "Sixth—The national government should make loans to the state governments, on state bonds, secured by first mortgages on real estate, in order that farmers can get loans from the state at cost.

"Seventh—Immediate reduction of freight and passenger rates, especially on food and fuel.

"Eighth—The immediate abandonment of all interference with political rights of employes in the public service, and abandonment of the exercise of any further postoffice censorship.

"Ninth—Liquidation of the national debt through reforms in the income and inheritance taxes.

"On Right of Labor."

"Tenth—Restoration of the rights of labor, surrendered for patriotic reasons, and the repealing of laws regulating the civil rights of people as war measures.

"Eleventh—All use of the mails, telegraph, telephone and express companies and banks shall be denied for making sales of goods, properties, investments or securities, except for direct delivery by the owner or his authorized agent, and then of the specific goods, properties, investments or securities involved, in order to eliminate gambling and speculation in necessities of life."

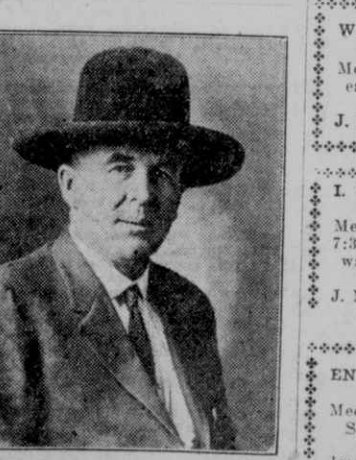
