

MONTANA DRY DEC. 31; SHUTS OFF RUM SUPPLY

BOOZE THAT HAS TRICKLED INTO
IDAHO FROM STATE TO EAST
WILL BE NO MORE.

MUST COME FROM CALIFORNIA

Liquor Can No Longer Be Sold in Ne-
vada and Wyoming Will Enter
Prohibition Column Soon

Where will Idaho get its booze?
That is a puzzling question, indeed.
Montana, to the east, goes dry next
Tuesday night, at midnight.
Wyoming, to the east of southern
Idaho, enters the dry column on Jan-
uary 15, next.

Nevada, to the south, recently became
bone dry territory.
Only from far-off California can booze
be imported to Idaho, and such importa-
tion would be a violation of both fed-
eral and state laws.

Idaho, which has been classed as dry
territory for the last four years, has
received from time to time liquor from
neighboring states. Although importa-
tion of liquor into the state has been
in violation of both the state and feder-
al statutes, authorities have been unable
to entirely suppress the liquor traffic.
Large quantities of whiskey and other
liquors have been seized at various
times over the state and only recently,
at Boise, thousands of dollars worth of
contraband booze were poured into the
sewer by the authorities.

Booze, it is said, has been brought
into the state of Idaho at frequent in-
tervals from Montana during the last
year. It has been smuggled through
on both passenger and freight trains, by
automobile, by pedestrians, and on pack
horses. But now, with the sale of booze
becoming illegal in Montana, Nevada,
and Wyoming, all of which states were
popular bases for thirsty Idahoans, it
will be next to impossible for the amber
fluid to reach Idaho. Only from Cali-
fornia or from ships in the Pacific ocean.

can it likely be bought, and the ex-
pense and risk in bringing it from these
places would tend to make liquor vir-
tually an unknown article within the
bounds of the Gem state.
