## DRY AMENDMENT IS RATIFIED BY THE LEGISLATURE

**SENATE CONCURS IN HOUSE RESOLUTION TO STOP MANUFACTURE**

## UNANIMOUS VOTE IS CAST

**President Pro Tem Excused from Voting, Because He Doubts Legality of Measure.**

Idaho through the action of the state senate Wednesday ratified the amendment to the federal constitution seeking to prohibit forever the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors in the United States.

The senate concurred with the house when it passed by unanimous vote house joint resolution No. 1, introduced and championed by Mrs. Emma Drake of Payette county, one of the women members of the lower house.

The vote was unanimous for the resolution, there being 38 ayes. Senator Whitcomb, president pro tem of the senate, was excused from voting. The resolution came up under suspension of the rules and a roll call was taken placing a record vote in the journal. Senator Whitcomb explained that he did not desire to vote for the resolution because that as a lawyer, and because of his legal training, he did not believe that an amendment of the constitution was the right way to reach and eliminate the evil sought.

**Salmon River Stores Company Hauls From Here to Whitebird.**

The Salmon River Stores company of Whitebird now is hauling its freight overland from Grangeville to Whitebird. For several years the company has freighted from Penn. The Interior warehouse in Grangeville is used for storage of incoming freight for the Salmon River stores, and one freighter is regularly kept on the road, with additional freighters as the occasion demands.

ments, the heads of which, so far as the constitution permits, shall be directly responsible to the governor. The functions of every officer, bureau, board or commission in the state should be assigned to one of these departments. The departments should be subdivided where necessary into bureaus, the heads of which and the subordinates under them being selected with a view of their expert fitness and qualifications for their respective positions.

**GOVERNOR'S CABINET.**

I further propose that the heads of the several departments including the constitutional elective officers, shall constitute a governor's cabinet or council, thereby furnishing a vehicle through which all the departments of the state government can be co-ordinated and correlated in their functions.
