Notes of the Week.

A very large acreage of grain has been seeded in the Rexburg country.

The coal fields in Fremont county promise well. The more they are looked into the better the prospects. Attorney W. T. Reeves was elected a school trustee in one of the Boise districts.

Sheriff Cutshaw, of Fremont county, was indulging in handshaking with old time friends in Blackfoot Monday.

A number of families have moved to the vicinity of Rexburg and settled, and others are going in.

Logan county is infested with crickets innumerable, and crickets hop and eat, but eat more than they hop.

Rev. J. M. Wilder and family visited in Pocatello several days this week.

Cantaloupes have appeared in St. Louis market and sell readily at 40 and 50 cents apiece.

Mosquitoes have gathered in millions along Blackfoot river bridge towards Fort Hall school.

Miss Lizzie Gallagher, of Pocatello, spent Saturday and Sunday in Blackfoot, the guest of Miss Blanche Jones.

Mr. Geo. Hammond is improving his 10 acre lot in southern part of town and will erect a residence for his family thereon.

Dr. Givens, superintendent of the asylum, was on the sick list and confined to his bed several days of last week.

As an evidence that everything is growing in this country: last year postage stamps were a little over half the size of those of this year.

The reports and assurances of definite action by congress on the money question have a cheering effect and are already brightening the business outlook.

Florida shipped last season 3,900,000 boxes of oranges at an average price of \$1.31 per box. A conservative estimate of the present crop is placed at 5,000,000 boxes.

Walter Ramsey, at one time at Ross Fork agency, held a desk in the old Ford theatre building, Washington, at the time of its collapse but was absent at the time of the accident.

Sixty-eight clerks in the General Land Office at Washington are booked for dismissal 1st of July. This is not a political move, but is made under requirements of the appropriation bill.

The school board held its first meeting Saturday afternoon and organized by electing James McTucker chairman and Geo. F. Gagon secretary. No other business was transacted.

Rev. A. H. Lyons of Pocatello will occupy the pulpit at the Baptist Church Sunday morning and evening. Rev. Mr. Gage, pastor, will, in exchange, go to Pocatello and fill Mr. Lyons' pulpit.

It is told by those who know their habits that eels and carp fish remain in the same position all winter. They go near the bottom of reedy lakes or ponds early in the winter and remain there as long as there is any ice above them.

Washington advices say that Postmaster General Bissell will recede from his former rulings touching fourth class postmasters and will henceforth remove and appoint on the recommendations of Congressmen. All of which will be more satisfactory to the party.

Editor Wallis, of the Montpelier Post, waded an examination and is held for the U. S. grand jury for his alleged lottery scheme of disposing of a sewing machine.

Rev. G. C. Stull, for five years pastor of the M. E. church, Blackfoot, but now of Billings, Montana, spent Sunday and Monday with his old charge in Blackfoot. The Good Templars, by unanimous vote at their meeting Saturday evening, requested him to preach Sunday, and to this were added urgent requests of many old acquaintances and friends, but he declined to break in on the program for the day, Children's Day, but promised a special sermon on his returning visit. Mr. Stull has an excellent appointment at Billings and is doing good work.

Miss Mattie Hopkins represented Columbia, and Douglas Smith with "Just Laws," Perry Anson with "Worthy Rulers," Charlie Bassett with "Good Citizens," Annie Bassett with "Christian Schools," Eva Rogers with "True Religion" and Maud Hopkins with "Sacred Sabbath," her Defenses. Little Dot Cherry presided at the organ and captured the audience with her easy, graceful performance.

The church was crowded to overflowing, and the audience retired pleased with the efforts of the little folks.

A Collapse of Ford's Old Theater.

The collapse of Ford's old theater building, Washington D. C. Friday of last week, by which 24 lives were lost and more than 50 persons injured was a tragedy less national than that which occurred in the same building in 1865 but more destructive of life in point of numbers. It will be remembered that it was in this building Wilkes Booth assassinated President Lincoln.

For years past the old building has been used for offices for work in connection with the pension bureau and 500 clerks held desks therein. For a long time it has been considered unsafe and protest after protest was made against its use.

Friday it suddenly collapsed and 24 souls were hurried into eternity and more than a half hundred bodies mangled and bruised.

One of the strangest coincidences connected with the tragedy was that the building fell on the very day of the funeral and burial of Edwin Booth brother of the assassin Wilkes Booth.

Three Leading Issues.

NEW YORK, June 7.—The World has polled most of the members of the new Congress on three questions that will come before them at the next session—the Sherman silver law, an income tax and repeal of the State bank tax. There is an overwhelming sentiment in favor of repealing the Sherman silver law, tempered by a

feeling that in return a fair recognition of silver as a money metal should be given. On the question of an income tax the opponents and advocates of it are about tied. Western and Southern members favor it. A majority is found in opposition to the repeal of the tax on State banks' circulation.
