Horribly Mangled. A supposed shepherd, name unknown, attempted to beat his way from Idaho Falls to Pocatello on a freight train late Saturday afternoon of last week. He was under the influence of liquor when he boarded the train.

The place selected to ride was on the deck of an empty coal car. and when below the tank at Blackfoot river he is supposed to have fallen under the revolving wheels. Forty pieces of mangled remains were picked up between the point where he fell and Ross Fork. It was dark when the accident happened and the train men knew nothing of it until they reached the station.

SETTLED AT LAST. World's Fair Jury Finally Decides in Favor of Dr. Price.

Gov. McConnell at Blackfoot. His Excellency, Gov. McConnell, spent Friday of last week in Blackfoot. He was met at Pocatello by Messrs. Patrie and Bassett and on reaching Blackfoot went immediately to the Insane Asylum with its superintendent, Dr. Givens.

In the afternoon with the board of trustees and citizens he visited the public school and made an appropriate and pleasing talk to the pupils. Later Messrs. Berryman and Woodin took him in charge and behind their high headed trotters drove out to the country and showed him some of the large irrigating streams and ranches around town.

In the evening he addressed a large and attentive audience in the court room, devoting the principal part of his address to irrigation and immigration. His Excellency appeared at a far greater advantage Friday evening than he did on the same rostrum when making the canvass for governor of the state. His speech was well received and the chief points generally endorsed.

The Governor does well to visit the different counties and confer with the people in order to learn of their true condition, of their needs and necessities. From Blackfoot he went direct to Pocatello and thence to Rexburg and St. Anthony.
