Sugar Beets.

No country can produce better root crops than the Snake river valley, and this is particularly true of sugar beets. Wherever these beets have been tried and properly cultivated they grow to perfection. A number of farmers on the West side have made a trial test of growing them, and they are more than satisfied with results. We have one in the office to-day, grown by Mr. Geo. Worden, which weighs 8 pounds and no extra pains was taken in its

cultivation. In a few years, at most, beet sugar making will be one of the paying industries of this section.

Parents and School.

Last Monday the school year opened in Blackfoot. The opening was auspicious and the attendance large. To many pupils this will be an important year. With some it may be their last year in the school room. To some it may be the turning point in life.

The board of trustees believe they have given the school a good corps of teachers, but the best teachers who live are not omniscient, they do not know everything in the school room and out of the school room.

The better the teacher the more anxious he is about his work and to understand the temperament of his pupils; and here is where a duty of the parent comes in. He ought to consult with the teacher and help the school work; he ought to visit it for his child's sake and the teacher's sake. He ought to see its workings and know for himself.

Parents ought to manifest an interest in their children's training by watching them closely while at school. If trouble comes up between teachers and pupils a word of information or a suggestion from a parent may relieve it before it grows serious. All the parents of Blackfoot should make the acquaintance of the teachers of their children and inform themselves of the conditions under which they are to be placed this year. With an earnest co-operation of trustees, parents and teachers much good can be done this scholastic year and children advanced in their studies in a way beneficial to them and pleasing to all interested. Parents turn over a new leaf and for the year resolve to visit the school regularly.
