REV. J. M. WILDER

GIVES THE FACTS IN CONNECTION WITH HIS TROUBLE IN DENVER HE WAS BOLDLY ROBBED.

One of the Robbers Arrested, Confesses and Returns Part of the Stolen Money to its Owner.

ALVORD, Texas, August 29th.

Ed. News:—I respectfully desire to make the following statement of facts in connection with my robbery while in Denver en-route to Texas. So much has been given in the press contrary to all truth and to my injury as a christian and a minister, I ask you to publish my statement in THE NEWS:

I reached Denver at 8 a. m. Wednesday the 22d. I went to the office of the general passenger agent of the Denver & Gulf railroad and bought a ticket to Fort Worth.

As I stepped out of the office, a man approached me and said: "I am going to Fort Worth on this train, I am a son of Mr. Taylor, of Fort Worth." I am well acquainted with Mr. Taylor of that city; he is one of the prominent men, and believed the young man's story. We walked on together towards the depot and when about a block away he said: "The president of the Cripple Creek Mining Company is a friend of mine, and he told me he would give me some rich specimens of gold ore to take home if I would call before leaving the city; and then pointing down the street to the office, asked me to go with him. I consented, and after going a short distance he pointed and said: "This is the office."

When we entered the room, Taylor asked for the president and was told by one of three he had just gone to the postoffice for his mail and that he would return in a few minutes. While waiting Taylor asked me to loan him one dollar for a short time. I took out my purse and was in the act of opening it to accommodate him when he seized it and threw it on the table. One of the three men opened it, took my money and threw the empty purse back to me, and all three of them rushed out the room through a rear door. Then it dawned on me that I had been led into a den of thieves and had been robbed.

I went to police headquarters, swore out a warrant and had one of the party arrested. He admitted he and his pals had robbed me and returned part of the \$48 taken from me. The other two had not been arrested when I left the city. These are the facts in the case. Respectfully,
