Help the Nebraska Sufferers.

Rev. A. H. Lyons, of Pocatello, has been requested by the Relief Committee to try and secure a car load of flour from Idaho for the drouth sufferers in Nebraska. The railroad company offers to transport the car free of charge. He has requested all the large towns along the railroad in the State to assist in making up the car load, which will consist of 600 sacks. Blackfoot has been asked to donate 50 sacks, and B. H. Holbrook Sr., has been appointed by Rev. Lyons to see if that number can be secured.

The people in the drouth stricken district of Nebraska are in dire need of provisions and much suffering among them is reported. This is the first opportunity of this kind our people have had to show their sympathy for a suffering community, and they will no doubt contribute liberally.

Mr. Holbrook will wait on the citizens with a subscription paper next Thursday, and we hope all whom he may approach will make a donation.

LEGISLATURE IN SESSION.

Both Houses Meet Promptly at Noon and Perfect Organization.

The third session of the Idaho legislature began promptly at noon last Monday. As is usual at the opening of sessions the galleries and lobbies were thronged with interested spectators. But little enthusiasm was shown among the members in the organizations as the matter of selecting employes had been agreed upon in the respective caucuses the week previous.

IN THE SENATE.

The Senate met in the Senate chamber at 12 o'clock noon. Lieutenant Governor Mills in the chair.

The members were sworn in by Justice J. T. Morgan of the supreme bench. The first order of business was the election of officers and the same resulted as follows:

IN THE HOUSE.

The House met at the same hour as the Senate and was called to order by Speaker Miller of the last session. Secretary of State read the certified list of the members elect and Chief Clerk Reed of the last session called the roll.

The organization was then proceeded with in accordance with the plans of the caucus. The following are the officers elect:

The Senate was then notified of the organization of the House; a committee of three was appointed to wait on the governor and the House then adjourned to 10 o'clock, Tuesday.

The time of the week following the organization of the two branches will be taken up in putting the machinery of the two bodies in perfect working order and the introduction of bills and joint resolutions.
