To Hang Again.

"Diamondfield Jack" who has been sentenced to hang as often as Aguilado was killed, has been sentenced to hang again, Friday, June 21.

"Diamondfield Jack," it will be remembered, was convicted of killing two sheepherders in Cassia county, several years ago. His case has been up and down in all the courts from district court to United States supreme court and back again.

It is not certain that he will hang in June. His attorneys are making a strong fight for his life. There are some remarkable things connected with the case. He plead not guilty to the charge of murder and was convicted. Another man confessed to the killing, was tried and acquitted. This is the most remarkable case in the criminal history of the west.

Notes From the New School Laws.

The new school laws go into effect May 1st.

Next school year begins Monday, September 23, 1901.

The school age has been changed from 5 to 21 years to from 6 to 21 years.

Every district in the State must have at least five months of school or the district will lapse.

The school census will be taken this year at the usual time, viz: on the first Monday in July. After this year the school census will be taken on the first Monday in April.

At least three per cent of the moneys annually appropriated to any district shall be applied by the trustees for the maintenance of a school library; selections of books for which being made from a list of books furnished to each district by the State board of education.

ABOUT CERTIFICATES.
County certificates shall be signed by the county superintendents and associate examiner or examiners.

First grade certificates shall be granted to all applicants, otherwise qualified by law, who shall have passed all the branches heretofore required, and algebra, general history and rhetoric in addition thereto.

The holder of a third grade certificate shall be ineligible to obtain another certificate of the same grade.

Teachers holding valid second grade certificates, with an average of 90 per cent, or above, may take the additional branches and receive a first grade certificate.

County superintendent may renew first grade certificates at their expiration, so long as the teacher is actually engaged in teaching.

Primary certificates shall be granted, to be good only in primary departments of graded schools, and which includes the first four grades, and examination for such certificates shall be upon questions prepared by the State superintendent of public instruction.

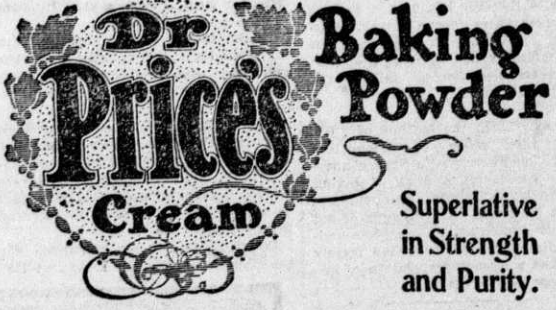
