#### From Our Boise Correspondent.

BOISE, Ida., May 1.—DEAR NEWS: Here we are up to May-day and Dewey day.

Boise, the beautiful, the city of orchards and flowers, is a bouquet to the traveler who dust covered has just arrived from a journey over sage brush plains and foot hills.

The city is in the midst of a quiet season with just rest enough for one to enjoy the beauty of blooming trees and shrubs and to inhale the fragrance of sweet flowers.

The capital building is in a sea of calms. The attorney general, secretary of state and mine inspector are in the eastern part of the state for a few days.

Governor Hunt has practically filled his list of appointments; the last being the board of arbitration.

Mrs. C. E. Thum, wife of the Post Trader Thum of the Fort Hall reservation, is a late arrival to visit with her parents, Gen'l and Mrs. Perrault.

The board of regents of the State university will be in session today to accept plans and specifications for the new buildings for that institution. The architect is in the city with his work ready for presentation.

Boise was greatly pleased with Nathan Hale at the Columbia, last night. It was a good play and the theater goers enjoyed it 'bigly.' The Chicago and Portland train was held at Nampa one hour and forty minutes to await the company after its performance here at the Columbia.

There is a marked difference between Boise and Blackfoot in railroad matters. Boise talks railroad, Blackfoot constructs railroad. Boise anticipates railroads, Blackfoot has a new road on its hands. Boise has the Midland on paper, Blackfoot has the Salmon branch under construction. Boise dreams of itself as a great railroad center. Blackfoot sees its own importance with the open eye. Boise prays for the Midland road to Montana. Blackfoot promises Boise a branch from its great road which is to be the link uniting north and south Idaho.

The district court will take up its regular docket next Monday and hurry the cases to trial. The time of the court this week was taken up, principally, in hearing motions, arguments in demurrers and in setting cases for trial.

#### Fort Hall Canal.

Washington, D. C., April 29.—Prof. Elwood Mead, irrigation expert of the Agricultural department, today filed with the Secretary of the Interior a report upon the Snake river, Ida., irrigation canal built to supply the Indians upon the Fort Hall reservation with water for irrigation purposes. The canal in question was built by the Idaho Canal company, which contracted with the Government to supply a certain amount of water, which amount the canal has failed to carry. By reason of this failure, the Government refused to pay for the canal construction as provided by the contract with the canal company. Prof. Mead, who was sent by the Government to examine the canal, recommends in his report that the Government purchase the entire line of canal upon the reservation and operate it for the benefit of the Indians independently of the Idaho Canal company.—S. L. Tribune.

#### New Base Ball Rules.

To lovers of the national game the following may prove of interest.

Spaulding's guide gives the new 1901 rules: "The first and second foul balls hit by the batsman, unless two strikes have already been called, henceforth will be counted strikes. The catcher will now stand within ten feet instead of ninety feet of the plate throughout the game. The pitcher will deliver the ball to the batsman as soon as the latter takes his position. Should the pitcher deliver the ball to any other place a ball will be called for each delivery. The umpire is empowered to remove from the game and if necessary from the grounds any person guilty of using improper language. The batsman may not take his base if hit by a pitched ball, but the ball will be counted as a ball against the pitcher. The last named will do away with the practice of getting touched for the sake of a base. As a whole the rules will tend to quicken the play and make the game more popular. Most games have been so long drawn out as to much decrease the interest."

State Horticultural Inspector A. McPherson, of Boise, arrived in Blackfoot, Wednesday, and after investigating the orchards in this vicinity two days, he finds our trees in fairly good condition. He goes from here to other sections of the State where his time and services are much more in demand. In conversation with a representative of THE NEWS Mr. McPherson says a wrong impression has gone out regarding the appointment of some of the district inspectors made upon the recommendation of the society which should not exist. I have been a member of the society ever since its organization and it has been our aim to keep it out of politics and seek to have appointments made regardless of political association or influence.

Gov. Hunt has appointed a committee of about sixty citizens from all sections of the State to meet President McKinley and party and escort them through the southeastern portion of Idaho, June 1st. Members of the committee at Blackfoot are: Senator Dubois, John G. Brown and J. W. Jones. Ex-Senator Shoup will have charge of the Idaho arrangements.

The case of State vs. Parley Crofts is set for next Thursday, at 2 p. m., and the one against Fred Howard next Wednesday at 10 a. m. The cases of Geo. Munroe and Wm. Johnson were dismissed. Monday the 13th at 10 a. m. is fixed as the time for the case of Curtis vs. Kirkpatrick.

A dispatch from Wallace, Ida., states that the Frisco mine will close down May 2d for an indefinite period. The shut-down is due to the demoralizing condition of the lead market and the desire of the mine owners to make much-needed repairs on the flume and shaft. The Frisco employs about 300 men.
