

BLACKFOOT'S CELEBRATION.
First Fourth of the New Century a Great Day.
A GREAT CROWD
A Large Number of Visitors—A Day Brim Full of Pleasure and Enjoyment.

Blackfoot's celebration of the first Fourth of the new century, the one hundred and twenty-fifth anniversary of the Nation's independence, will live long in the memory of those who participated in the celebration, and will be given a bright page in the history of the town.

The day was bright, cool and fairly favorable for out-of-door exercises. The morning program consisting of national songs, band music, reading of declaration and an oration, fully met public expectations. It did more, it was thoroughly pleasing. The oration by Col. Ferguson was a departure from the beaten track followed by many Fourth of July orators—it was along new and original lines, historic, patriotic, eloquent and was forcefully and pleasingly delivered.

After the exercises at the stand, the minor sports were given and a noon recess was taken for the feast of old fashioned barbecue.

In the afternoon which was given to base ball and races, Pocatello and Blackfoot entered the diamond for a purse of \$50 for the winner and a consolation purse of \$25 for the defeated. After an interesting game the score was announced, Pocatello 21, Blackfoot 10. This game was followed by a trotting race in which Barnhart's sorrel was winner of first purse, \$60, and Plant's gray, second, \$30.

Saddle horse race, Jim Mackle first \$10; Phil Lavatta second, \$5.

Mile dash, M. Lewis first, \$32.50; J. Smash second, \$17.50.

Quarter race, California Joe, first, \$20; John Baker, second, \$14.

Ladies' race, Clyne, first, \$6.50; Williams, second, \$3.50.

The exercises of the day closed with a ball in the court house, which was crowded to overflowing.

Blackfoot's celebration of the first Fourth of the new century was a great celebration and although recorded on a leaf now behind in history, it will be fresh and green in the memory of those present after other celebrations have come and gone.
