sprung in the South. The atmospheric
disturbance about the hotels indicate
a storm.

Bingham county is to be specially
honored at the Commercial Conven-
tion. E. S. Whittier is to respond to
the address of welcome; Capt. Eichel-
berger to lead in the discussion on
immigration and F. W. Beane on the
Columbia Fair.

The U. P. will sell excursion tick-
ets for the Holidays at single fare for
round trip. For Christmas selling
dates December 24th and 25th. New
Year selling dates Dec. 31, and Janu-
ary 1st, all tickets good to return un-
til January 5th. Tickets will be sold
from and to all stations within a dis-
tance of 250 miles.

Attorney General Roberts has given
an opinion that all county and pre-
cinct officers who failed to qualify
within thirty days after the canvass-
ing of the returns by the county com-
missioners have forfeited their office.

college.
