## Select School Teachers

The school board of district 33 (Meridian) met Monday night and hired the eight teachers required for the coming year. A. W. Fuller, eighth grade teacher was retained and will be principal. Mrs. Randall, Miss Casey, and Miss Bess Cunningham were retained for another year, while four new teachers, consisting of Miss Annie Payne, Boise; Miss Ferguson, Herbine, Neb.; Miss Zook, Harvard, Neb.; and Miss Sebern, Meridian, were engaged. Charles Pitcher was reappointed janitor.

The members of the rural high school board met in Meridian Tuesday evening and reorganized. Charles Howry, of Victory, was selected as chairman; Wm. Moreland, of Locust Grove, Clerk, and J. W. Hudson, of Upper Fairview, treasurer. After organization the board adjourned without taking action on the selection of teachers.

This will be done at the special meeting to be held later.

In the mention of chairmen last week, I. N. Martin was credited from the Remington district. This should have been E. C. Bickford, who is the new chairman. Upper Fairview has organized and reappointed J. W. Hudson, chairman. It is understood that this district will take action, through a petition, to withdraw from the high school district. The people were taken in against their will but under the revised law, can separate themselves from the district by proper representation to the county commissioners.

## School Notes

The eighth grade have been taking the final examination the past two days. These are the last subjects that they have to finish their grade. They took several subjects the previous examination and received some excellent grades.

The agriculture class has secured the lots west of Dr. Neal's residence for experimenting in agriculture. If you would like to see some expert gardening keep your eye on this class and its work.

## Railroad Men Coming.

On Friday, May 5th, from 6 to 7 o'clock, p. m., a special train, carrying the general officials of the Oregon Short Line railway, will be in Meridian. The officers are taking a five-weeks' tour over the road on what is called a "Get Acquainted" trip. Among the prominent men on the special will be General Supt. Manson, Gen. Mgr. Bancroft and others. The hour's stay in Meridian will be sufficient to hear the recommendations of citizens in regard to improvements, and suggestions for the benefit of the service. The opening of First street with a suitable crossing across the tracks, the parking of the depot grounds, placing electric lights in and near the depot, these and other important matters should be presented to the officials, and they promise to give such due consideration.

Local Agent Frank Williams states that this would be a splendid chance for giving the railroad people an idea of the needs of the town in the way of factories as well as improvements, and that a proper showing may result in something of real value in the future. The invitation is general to everyone to be at the depot at the time mentioned and meet the visitors.

## Fighting Orchard Pests.

The Boise-Payette Valley Spray Co. plant in Meridian has turned out and sold 1300 barrels of lime and sulphur solution to the orchardists this spring, with which to combat the San Jose scale. This is double the amount of last year. Spraying for San Jose scale is practically completed now, with the exception of those places where the work was not done and the inspector has ordered such places to be attended to at once. The next work will be to look to the codling moth, and for this arsenate of lead is used.

Fruit Inspector B. E. Rayburn, of Ustick, who is the deputy in charge of inspection work in Ada and Elmore counties, has been in the Meridian section for several days, and he has sent out many notices to owners that they must spray their trees or suffer the penalty for such neglect. He says he has found some old orchard trees, in and near town, that were covered with scale, and he intends that this vicinity shall be cleaned up this spring. He says it is not too late to spray at any time, but a better effect can be gained by doing the work early in the spring.
