In the matter of the petition of the Board of Directors of the Settlers' Irrigation District praying for the judicial examination and approval and confirmation by the court of all the proceedings of said Board and said District relating to the entering into a contract with the United States of America for the purchase of approximately 262.5 miners inches of the storage waters of the Arrowrock Reservoir for use upon the dry or partially dry lands lying under the canals of and within said District and irrigated thereby, and a like confirmation and approval of an apportionment of benefits to said lands for the purchase price of such waters as basis for the levying of twenty annual assessments on said lands for the purpose of paying off and discharging the purchase price of such storage water, and for a confirmation and approval of all the proceedings of the said District and its said Board in relation to the said contract and purchase.
