Another Change of Time

TIME WILL AGAIN CHANGE
ONE HOUR MARCH 30TH.

At 2 o'clock in the morning on Sunday, March 30th, time will again change in the state of Idaho. All clocks will move one hour ahead, placing this territory on regular or old time. Orders to this effect are said to have been issued by the United States railroad administration. They are in compliance with the provisions of what is known as the general law "To save daylight and to provide standard time for the United States."

By the terms of the order all trains it is said, will be held at various stations at 2 o'clock Sunday morning March 30th, to catch up with the hour lost by them when the clocks are turned ahead one hour. They will thereafter proceed as before and in this simple manner the train schedule of the country will be adjusted.

Editor Times: Complying with your request for an expression relative to the rebuilding and otherwise improving the state highway through Meridian as a memorial to the boys of our community who made the supreme sacrifice in the past war, will say:

By all means let's make a boulevard something instead of the hog wallow we have had out of Meridian's share of the state highway.

If the tax payers of Meridian were hanged in not getting value received for the money expended in the original construction this is not a good reason no effort should be made to better the plight in which we now find ourselves. Had Jonah reconciled himself to the predicament in which he found himself after being swallowed up by the whale and had made no effort to free himself, he likely would be there yet but we can imagine that Jonah's efforts to free himself were as though they meant life or death. Meridian should be no less energetic in freeing herself from a predicament that may mean life or death to her continuing on the state highway.

To Meridian, view it from whatever angle you may, the highway is a commercial necessity. So let's off with our coats and up with our sleeves and put our share of the highway in a condition that will be a credit to our town and a joy to ourselves.

It is only natural that a community that has contributed to the success of the past war (in lives) as has Meridian, should have a desire and longing to do something to show and to perpetuate its appreciation. In the kindest spirit possible, I wish to state that some communities seem to be overzealous in their anxiety to erect what seemingly to them, would be a suitable and appropriate memorial, but which, to my mind, to an extent, tends to commercialize the sacredness of the memory of our beloved dead.

Personally, and as one whose home has been affected by the war by the severing of family ties, I would prefer to see just one tree planted and cared for on some community center ground, such as school or church, or both, with inexpensive tablet, stating who for, etc. than to see a whole mile of trees planted and the finest possible boulevard constructed. In commemoration of loved ones. By all means let's have the boulevard or at least maintain the highway in a creditable manner, but let us do it from a commercial standpoint and because it is a commercial necessity.

Reports come from the Modern Woodman special head camp meeting at Chicago, stating that a 50 per cent raise will be made on the beneficiary assessments beginning July 1st. The raise must first be ratified by the membership. While it has been desired that the rate be kept low, the order is up against the proposition of raising the rates for more revenue to pay death losses.

Remember the meeting of the Boise Valley Holstein Cattle men will be held in Meridian Monday evening, March 31 for the purpose of organizing a Holstein breeders cattle club. The purpose of the club will be to further the interests of Holstein breeders in buying cooperatively and disposing of their surplus cattle. A Jersey club was organized a short time ago and since organizing thirty pure bred Jerseys have been brought into the valley. All owners of Holstein cattle are urged to be present.

Monroe Doctrine Safe

SENATOR BORAH WINS WITH LEAGUE AMENDMENT

It looks like Senator Borah and others have scored a distinct triumph this week. The provision protecting the Monroe doctrine has been favorably received in Paris, and the objectionable clause in the original draft will be changed. This is a distinct triumph for the distinguished senators who ran the risk of incurring the displeasure of President Wilson by insisting that nothing should go in the constitution of the league of nations that would deprive the United States of its power in dealing with the little nations squib of us in our own way—which perhaps might not be the European way.

The Monroe doctrine, established by President Monroe, which we have maintained for more than one hundred years, is a doctrine of self protection and means that any foreign country cannot establish a colonial system on the western hemisphere. It is said that the adoption of the League of Nations covenant as proposed and energetically favored by President Wilson would in a great measure render inoperative the Monroe doctrine, as it would take from the United States its authority to act independently.

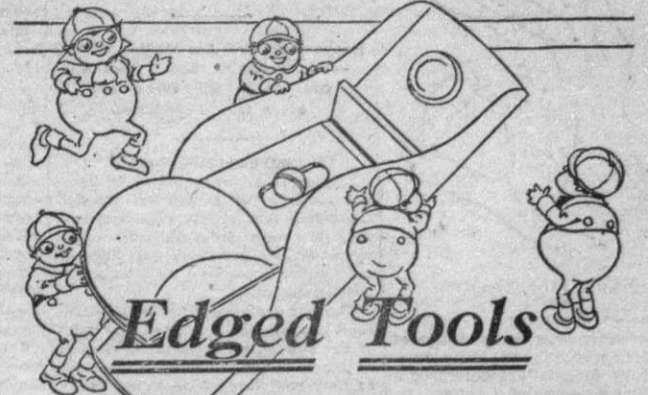
