MERIDIAN'S PICTURE SHOW JOINS THE CIRCUIT

B. W. Bickert, manager of the Strand, Empress and Majestic in Boise, and the Orpheum and Majestic in Nampa, has taken over the Meridian theatre and it will be a part of the Majestic Amusement Co. circuit. The name "Meridian Theatre" will be changed to the "Empress." A new electric sign was placed yesterday, bearing the new name. At the present time Wednesday and Saturday will be show nights and later on other nights may be arranged.

One advantage of the new arrangement will be that the same high-class pictures shown at the Majestic and Strand in Boise will be presented. John Hedges will be retained as local manager.

Carl Knutson, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. K. Knutson, arrived home from France Sunday. Carl was with the regiment that made a record in the battles of the Argonne, and he was wounded in the head. He left Meridian for France over a year ago as a member of the 40th division, and was later transferred to 32d., in the 128th infantry and it was while with this unit he was wounded on October 14th. After leaving the hospital, he spent four months with the army of occupation in Germany. He was near Coblenz. He says that unfortunately the German people are in a fairly prosperous condition as compared with the French and Belgians, and the German territory shows but little effect of the war.

Four local business places, the Meridian Hardware Co., Adams' restaurant, the offices of the Gem State and Boise Payette lumber companies, were broken into Tuesday night. The only place where valuables were taken was at the office of the Gem State lumber yard, where \$25 in war savings stamps are missing. The work is crude and may be that young boys are implicated, but no clue has been found as yet.

Vera Ruth, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Fowler, died at the family home south of Meridian, May 26th, at the age of 8 years, 8 months and 14 days. Throat trouble, resembling diphtheria, was the cause of death. A brief service was conducted on the lawn at the home by Carman E. Mell, of the Christian church. Only the family were present. Interment was in Morris Hill cemetery.

The Allen Wilcox residence property, on the corner of State street and the State highway has been purchased by the Christian church as a parsonage. The property is desirable, and the church people made a wise choice for a home for their pastor, L. A. Songer and family will move to a new residence being built for them by George Parkin in the east part of town.

J. H. McSparran, having closed the term of school at Montour, came to Meridian Wednesday with his household goods. Mr. McSparran plans to make his home in Emmett, while Mrs. McSparran is away for an extended visit with relatives in the east.

David Brewer, of Caldwell, came over this week and purchased the barber shop formerly owned by him, and recently conducted by R. L. Johnson. Mr. and Mrs. Brewer will again become residents of Meridian.

A fire at the ranch of Mrs. Geo. F. Edwards, two miles south of Meridian, last week, destroyed two barns and the loss was about \$500 with no insurance.

EDITORIAL MENTION.

Both Decoration day and July 4th come this year on Friday.

"A Keep to the Right" cement post and sign has been put at the four corners of the principal business block in Meridian. This means that auto drivers will not make a short turn on the wrong side of the street.

There has been a slight change in the O. S. L. time card. No. 176 (an extra "pony") passes Meridian at 4:22 p. m. for Huntington, and thus making an extra west bound train in the afternoon.

Waldo Burns, after two years of interesting war-time experience, attached to the 25th aero squadron, as machinist, has arrived at Camp Lewis, Wash. He arrived three weeks ago at a New Jersey port, from France. As he will not be released until about the first of July, his mother plans to pay him a visit in a few days, at Camp Lewis.

About a quarter of a million pounds of wool are pooled and in storage at the warehouses of the association of growers, at Meridian, Nampa, Caldwell, Payette, and Emmett, and also Midvale and Council. C. A. Cairns, of Meridian, buyer for the association, says bids will be opened in Meridian June 10th for the purchase of this wool. Many buyers will no doubt be present. The wool is mostly of the "medium grade."

The members of the Meridian high school board and the grade school board have mutually agreed on the "6 and 6" plan as before mentioned in the Times, and which means that 6 grades will be taught in the grade school and six in the high school. The appointment of the teachers for the high school and the selection of grades will be made by the newly-appointed superintendent, Prof. Powers, and announced in a few days. The list has already been announced of the grade teachers, but the high school force awaits the action of the board and the new superintendent.


