**Will Be Good**  
MANILA, April 28.—About 300 of the enemy have been killed recently in North Bataan, including Dodd's fight and the attack on Bato. April 16, when from 600 to 700 rebels, a quarter of whom were armed with rifles, determinedly attacked the Americans, charging their positions and fighting at close quarters. The engagement lasted all the afternoon, the enemy burning the town, but they were repulsed after the arrival of American reinforcements.

The insurgents generally are aggressive in that province. They captured an American provision wagon near Lapo. The Americans having obtained evidence that alcaldes of Mago, Lingaspa, Labugas and Sinait were holding treacherous communications with the insurgents, imprisoned them and burned Lapo town hall.

There have been several minor fights in the province, including an attack by 200 insurgents on Lavag, April 17, 40 of whom were killed and 80 were captured.

The officers report that the men of the Thirty-third regiment and Third cavalry behaved splendidly under very trying circumstances. There were no American casualties at Bato, where 180 insurgents were killed and 70 captured.

#### ORDINANCE No. 273.

An Ordinance to Prevent Animals from Running at Large Upon the Streets, Lanes, Alleys and Public Grounds in the City of Lewiston, Idaho.

The City of Lewiston does ordain as follows:  
Section 1. It is hereby made unlawful for any cow, calf, ox, steer, bull, horse, mare, colt, stallion, mule, jack, jenny, hog, pig, goat, kid, sheep or lamb to run at large in or upon any street, lane, alley or public ground in the city of Lewiston, Idaho.

Sec. 2. It is hereby made the duty of the city marshal at any and all times, when any animal or animals mentioned in section one of this ordinance are found running at large, in or upon any of the streets, lanes, alleys or public grounds within the corporate limits of the city of Lewiston, Idaho, to immediately take up the same and notify the owner thereof, if known, and if not known, the marshal shall post notice of such taking up in three public places within the said city, and also cause to be published in the city papers, for one regular issue only, a correct description of such animal or animals, giving their marks and brands, if any; which notice shall also contain a provision that unless said animal or animals be reclaimed and all charges paid within five days from the date of the publication of said notice, the said animal or animals will be sold to pay costs and charges, stating the time and place of said sale.

Sec. 3. The marshal is hereby authorized to sell any and all unredeemed or unclaimed property described herein for cash, to pay costs and expenses. The money derived from such sale, less the costs and expenses, shall be paid into the city treasury, and shall remain for one year, and may within that time be claimed by the owner of the property sold, upon production before any justice of the peace in the city of such evidence as would be required to establish his claim in any court of justice—obtaining from such justice of the peace an order upon the treasurer to pay such money, which order shall be sufficient to warrant the treasurer for such payment, to be reported as other redeemed warrants.

Sec. 4. The marshal shall be entitled to recover the following fees, to wit: For posting notices as required by section 2 of this ordinance, one dollar per head, not to exceed in any event however \$2.50 per notice; for keeping the animals, thirty-five cents per day per head; for selling the same, one dollar per head and five per cent of all money paid to the treasurer arising from such sale.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall not apply to cows giving milk and kept for that purpose, while going or coming from the range, between the hours of 6 and 8 o'clock a. m. and 4 to 8 o'clock p. m.

Sec. 6. Ordinance No. 86, and all other ordinances to prevent animals from running at large in the city of Lewiston are hereby repealed.

Sec. 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after five days after its passage, approval and publication.
