Be Here About Ten Days. The Miners will remain in Lewiston about ten days, possibly longer, when they will leave, headed for the coast, opening the season at Seattle Saturday, April 20. En route to the coast they will meet teams at Colfax, Palouse, Rosalia, Washington State college, University of Idaho, Ritzville, Prosser, North Yakima, and thence to Seattle. Games have already been arranged with the Clarkston, Lewiston State Normal and the University of Idaho teams, to be played next week. A game will be played Sunday with either the Normal or the Lewiston town team, probably on the Normal grounds. If those grounds cannot be secured the game will be played on the High school diamond. The baths and training quarters of the Normal school have been thrown open to the Miners through the kindness of Coach Calhoun of the Normal team. Seattle's Athletic Meet.
