PARSONS RUNS RECORD TIME

California Sprinter Equals Worlds Record of 9 3-5 Seconds

Charlie Parson ran the greatest race of his life Saturday against the crack Stanford sprinter and but for an imperfection in one of the stop-watches used, the local man would have been credited with the phenomenal time of 9 3-5 for the 100-yard dash, says C. E. Van Loan in the Los Angeles Examiner.

This would have given Parsons a worlds record for the distance and recognition as one of the greatest sprinters of his generation. Three watches were used in timing the race. One of them caught Parson's time at 9 3-5; the second was between 3-5 and 4-5. The latter time was given out and it was later discovered that this stop-watch was imperfect. A slight twist of the timing hand caused the watch to begin registering from the first fifth of the first second instead of the even minute.

Had this been known before the time was given out, in all probability the time would have been registered 9 3-5.

In the race Parsons was off the mark like a bullet, into his stride from the jump and the Stanford crack never had a chance with him. Parsons had the race won from the start, but he ran himself out, going over the line three yards in front of the nearest man.

On the 20th of this month Parsons will be sent after the world's record for the 100 yards. Judging by his race of Saturday the Methodist flyer will come very close to the mark accredited to Dan Kelly at Spokane. Dan Kelly is the member of the Multnomah Athletic club, who is now recognized as the world's greatest sprinter.

He holds the 100 yard record at 9 3-5 and has a record of 21 1-5 for the 220-yard dash.

The only time that Parsons raced against Kelly, the local sprinter had an easy victory, and he is more than anxious to lure Kelly south for the big games on the 20th of this month. If Daniel will consent to take a chance Parsons agrees to give him one yard handicap in the 100.

But the watches to be used in the timing of Parson's next attempt for the world's record will be placed in a jewelry store one week before the meet. Every one of them will be certified to be correct and they will be in the hands of experienced timers.

ED BRUYETTE MADE CAPTAIN

Russ Hall has made Ed Bruyette, his second baseman, captain of the Butte Miners for the season. This means that he is also to hold down the second cushion for a time. Bruyette played with the Utah State league last year, where he won a reputation for his clean, fast ball playing. He is a shortstop of no mean ability and will prove a winner for the team. His batting record is up among the 300 list.

SCHEDULE FOR NEW LEAGUE

The schedule of the Trolley league recently launched at a meeting of the managers at Moscow, has been announced by President Rothrock of the league. Four teams, Moscow, Colfax, Palouse, and Rosalia are the teams in the league.

There will be 15 games at each town with the exception of Moscow, which gets an extra game. The plan for old settlers' day has not been decided, but Colfax will play at Rosalia on that day.

The games between Moscow and Rosalia on July 20 and 21 may be changed from one town to the other, according to which town is drawing the best crowds. The season will open April 14 and will close July 21.

Out of 19 starts here Von Tromp won 10 races, and smart race men who witnessed his races say he is the champion aged horse of the California tracks.

Although an unsound horse it is safe betting that McKinney will get him to the races good and ready. When on edge Von Tromp can run a mile in 1:39 or better with his weight up.

"DEACON" WHITE WANTS GAMES

Veteran Leaguer Is Now Managing Edmonton Team

Lewiston is determined to have her share of the baseball exhibitions for this part of the country this season. When Russ Hall finishes up his training here and starts on his circuit of exhibition games before opening the season at Seattle April 20, "Deacon" White manager of the Edmonton league wishes to bring his team here to work out.

White has been almost insistent, and in letters recently received from him he asked that a bonus be guaranteed him in case he decided to bring his bunch here. Letters were gotten from him yesterday in which he writes:

"I would be glad to take the Edmonton team to Lewiston about April 20 and remain there about two weeks. You may arrange games for me on the following Saturday and Sunday, as you see fit. We will want to leave Lewiston about May 8, and work our way back to Lethbridge, Alberta, where our season opens on May 20. If this is satisfactory let me hear from you at once. I have all the players I can use at present if I have them all report."

Spokane is now the lodging place for White. His team has not yet reported at that city for service. The league teams in the circuit to which the Edmonton team belongs include the towns of Edmonton, Calgary, Lethbridge and Medicine Hat, all in Alberta.

F. J. Edwards, who is acting as manager of the Lewiston team has answered Mr. White's letter, giving him an excellent rate at one of the hotels. It is probable that he will have the team

report here as soon as Russ Hall and his bunch leave the city. Arrangements are under way to secure the use of the Normal ball grounds which are being used by the Butte team.
