A LITTLE GOSSIP.

And a metropolis she will be.

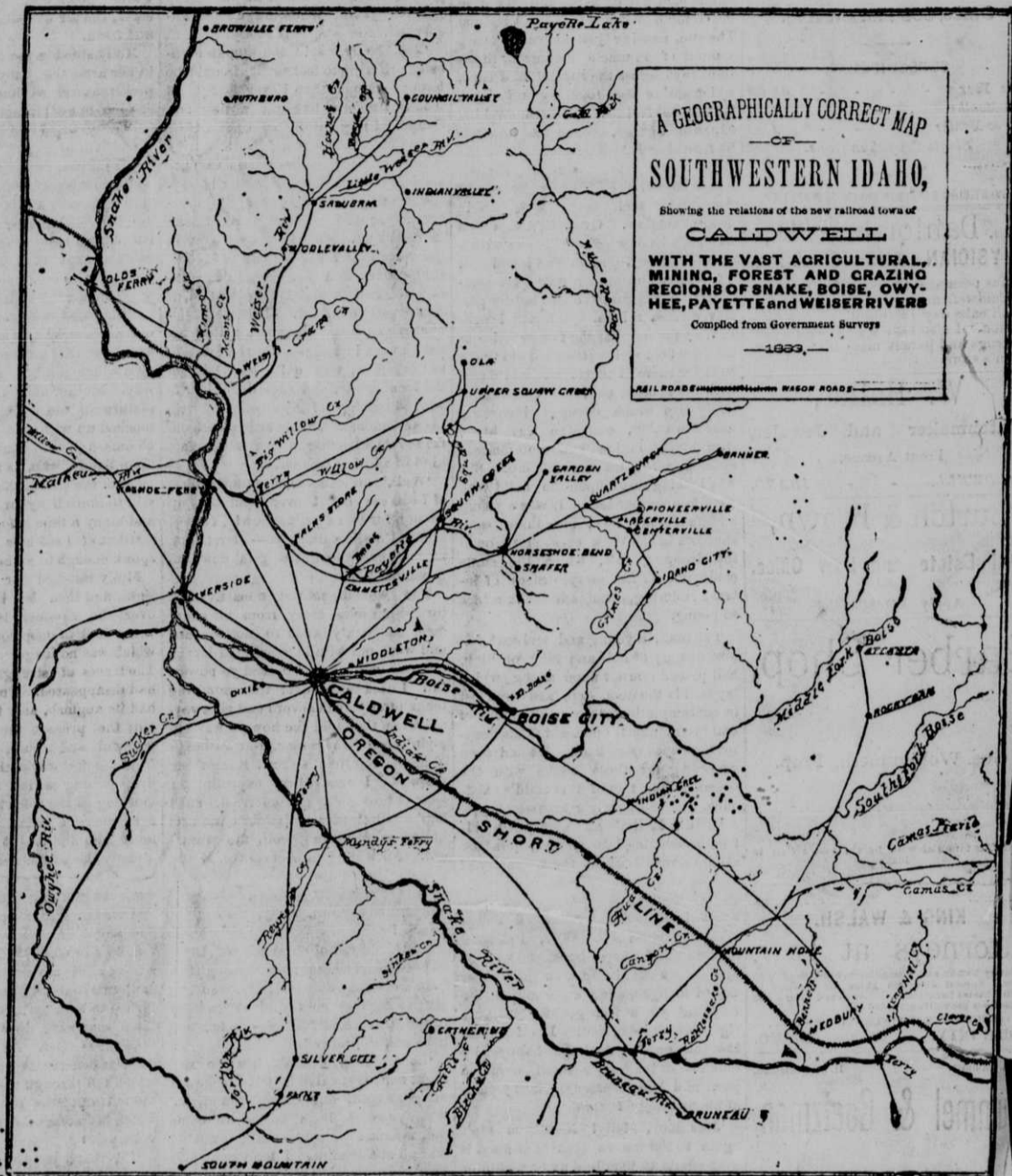
