THAT TEMPERANCE PETITION.

REV. L. A. BANKS, of Boise City, has gotten up a petition whose object is the regulation of the liquor traffic by the legislature. He asks us to comment on it, and we cheerfully comply.

Prohibition does not prohibit. See Maine, Kansas and Iowa.

High license works no benefit to any one or anything but the fund that receives the money. A few saloons will be closed, but their custom goes to the saloons that are open.

Local option is not a remedy. If the county votes against the sale of liquor, does anybody think the sale of liquor will be stopped? Because there can be no prohibition, there can be no effect in a local option law.

An act of the legislature cannot govern the appetite. If a man wants a drink he will get it, in spite of all the laws that may be enacted.

High license sounds well, but where it has been tried the number of cases of drunkenness has not diminished. Nebraska has a high license law, and in Omaha, the largest city in the state, a saloon license costs \$1,000 a year. We think our friends Crawford, of the Soda Springs Herald and Allen, of the Shoshone Journal, both direct from that city, will bear us out in the assertion that there never was so much drunkenness and criminal "quickness" generally there as there is now. This is not a good result of high license of a few years' duration.

Now, Mr. Banks, if you want to do effective temperance—not prohibition, mind you—work, begin with the generation growing up about you. Teach them the evil effects of using intoxicants. Let the old sinners alone; they are beyond redemption anyway.

BOB LINCOLN is likely to be the republican dark horse. There is a unanimity for him for vice president that will probably put him at the head of the ticket when the convention gets tired wrangling.

THE Boise City bridge is likely to cost more for care and repairs than the Caldwell bridge's cost of construction. The commissioners allowed last week over three hundred dollars for those purposes.
