the broader the aims of any organization, and the more it seeks of set straight the crooked social byways the more simple, direct, and single must be its methods. One may be a dilettante in art and letters, but in social, civic and sanitary problems one must be a practical worker with a definite purpose.

If the General Federation of Women's Clubs is still working for the intellectual and social benefit of its individual members through club interests and club gatherings, then it is fulfilling its purpose.

But if it desires to take its place as a power of permanent community betterment, for better municipal conditions, for a squarer deal for women and children in the home and out of it, then it must concentrate its magnificent aims and energies, and do a few things thoroughly and well.

Men, women, and children by the hundred thousand work day after day in factories which are fire-traps, around looms and machines which endanger their lives. The American Federation of Labor, two million strong, is trying to have better fire-laws passed, better protection guaranteed to workers. If the six million federated club women would join hands with the two million members of the labor unions, the miracle would be worked.

Politics and personal greed, to say nothing of downright incompetency among school boards, squander the taxpayers' money and waste the time of our children. If the six millions of federated club women gave one year to practical work, investigation, and reform in their local school conditions, children would be safer and better educated, and the school boards would do the work with economy as well as efficiency.

But when a club of two hundred women has ten departments, its energies and interests are too scattered to secure permanent results in any one direction. The steady pressure of public opinion, exerted through an organization, counts more than imported speakers, local publicity, and high-sounding resolutions.

A chain is only as strong as its weakest link. The weak link in the federated clubs is the lack of concentration and uniformity in methods. The high ideals of a national president can be realized only when each and every local club, each and

every individual member, understands those ideals and lives up to them. Every Fall, local papers publish extensive plans and programs for the local clubs. At the end of the year how many club members compare the plans with the accomplishment, the promises with the product delivered. Why not do less and do it well?

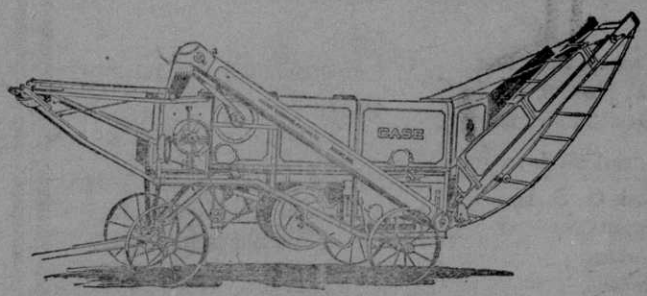
