

LOCATING MINING CLAIMS.

The following circular has been sent out from the General Land Office at Washington to United States Surveyors General and Registers and Receivers:

1. The rights granted to locators under Section 2323, Revised Statutes, are restricted to such locations on veins, lodes or ledges as may be "situated on the PUBLIC DOMAIN." In applications for lode claims where the survey conflicts with a prior valid lode claim or entry, and the ground in conflict is excluded, the applicant not only has no right to the excluded ground, but he has no right to that portion of any vein or lode the top or apex of which lies within such excluded ground, unless his location was prior to May 10, 1872. His right to the lode claimed terminates where the lode, in its onward course or strike, intersects the exterior boundary of such excluded ground and passes within it.

2. The end line of this survey should not, therefore, be established beyond such intersection, unless it should be necessary so to do for the purpose of including ground held and claimed under a location which was made upon public land and valid at the time it was made. To include such ground (which may possibly embrace other lodes) the end line of the survey may be established within the conflicting survey, but the line must be so run as not to extend any further into the conflicting survey than may be necessary to make such end-line parallel to the other end line, and at the same time embrace the ground so held and claimed. The useless practice of such cases of extending both the side lines in a survey into a conflicting survey and establishing an end-line wholly within it, beyond a point necessary under the rule just stated, will be discontinued.

3. After the receipt of this circular at the local land office all applications for mineral patents, applications to purchase, Register's final certificates of entry and Receiver's receipts must not only describe the ground claimed, but must state specifically what conflict or conflicts with other surveys, lots or claims are excluded, giving the number of each conflicting survey or lot. The published and posted notices must contain the same information.

Washington county—Weiser City, third Monday in March and first Monday in September.

THIRD DISTRICT—J. T. MORGAN, C. J.
Bingham County—Blackfoot, second Monday in May and second Monday in October.

Oneida county—Malad City, second Monday in April and second Monday in November.

Custer county—Challis, third Monday in June and first Monday in September.

Onas county—Albion, the first Monday in April and fourth Monday in August.

Bear Lake county—Paris, first Monday in July.

Lemhi county—Salmon City, first Monday in June and fourth Monday in September.

Supreme Court—Second Monday in January.

IMPORTANT TO SETTLERS.

C. N. McFarland, commissioner of the general land office, March 31 issued the following instructions to subordinates of the United States land office:

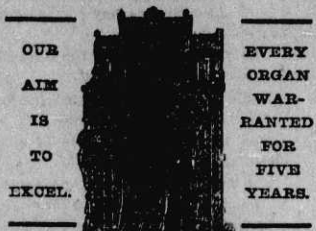
You are advised that, by direction of the Hon. Secretary of the Interior of the 27th ultimo, the issuance of notices in pre-emption final testimony of witnesses in pre-emption final proofs may only be taken before the register and receiver or the clerk of a court of record in the county or state or district and territory in which the lands are situated, is revoked. In taking final proof in pre-emption cases the testimony may be taken before any officer qualified to administer oaths and affirmations in public land cases in the county in which the land is situated.
