Mining and Business.

The last statistics show that during the past two years the United States sold to foreign nations \$250,000,000 less merchandise than in the preceding two years. That falling off makes the difference between flush and hard times. The reasons are many. Germany and France legislated against our products; the crops in the British Isles have been more abundant; prices for raw products have been greatly reduced; and, finally, the hard times in Europe have reduced the capacity of that country to buy. The significant fact remains that we can produce more food and cotton than the world can purchase; by neglecting all the lines which experience teaches other nations, our foreign trade is not sufficient to make a market for our manufactured goods, and so depression is upon us notwithstanding that the country grows under a superabundance of food, of goods and money. One would think that in such an emergency the rich men of the East would turn to Western mining and other Western enterprises to find use for their money. They would find plenty to encourage them. Surely, mining in Utah has never been more full of promise. Not only are all the great paying mines still yielding as well as ever—that is, save one—but in many of the old camps that had, in miner's parlance, received "a back eye," it is found that only pluck, good judgment and money were needed to show that the mines were as good as ever. The daily shipments show only in part what is going on. In many places the old crude ways have been abandoned and mines are being opened thoroughly with the intention of developing them in such a way that when they begin again to yield it will mean plenty of business for a term of years. In almost every case, too, this is being carried on solely on local pluck and money. The East not only holds aloof, but adds to an imbecile scorn the threat that the silver dollar is soon to be expunged from the Treasury. The Eastern man delights to tell how much some neighbor of his lost in mining speculation. He bought some shares in the Timbuctoo or the Will-o-the-Wisp, and he lost his money. Yet question such a man closely and he will confess that another neighbor lost in railway shares, another in a corn corner, another in unproductive city real estate, and he will, if driven to the wall, admit that the beautiful waving grain does not promise to pay for raising it a fair salary is paid to those who tilled the field and who will have to harvest the crop. These reflections are shaking the determination of men never to again engage in mining, as they have not been shaken for five years past. The wise ones declare that they already sniff another mining boom in the air. This ought to encourage men with good prospects to hold on and to work, in order to get their properties in as good a condition as possible. It requires very poor management of a very poor mine not to get from it more interest on money than people are glad to accept in the East. This eastern people will see after a while, and when they do their money will begin to come this way. In the meantime mining in the West takes away the terror which is upon all Eastern commercial circles. Here labor for a certain number of men, and a market for a certain amount of supplies is secured. There is no place in the Union where people ought to be so well contented as west of the Rocky Mountains.—Salt Lake Tribune.

Like General Grant, the first Napoleon died of cancer. In his case the cancer was in the stomach instead of the throat. It caused him much severer pain than Grant suffered. Toward the last he could not digest his food. He was tormented by a constant thirst. His pulse beat with a feverish quickness. He improved, grew worse and had all the hope, depression and despair that marked Grant's illness. Unlike the American soldier he did not retain his mental faculties to the last. The circumstances was different. Napoleon was a vanquished man, a prisoner, deserted by his wife, and surrounded only by the members of his military family. His last words referred to his son and the army. Grant not only suffered less, but his last hours were brightened by a thousand loving words and tributes from his wife and children, old army comrades, his former foes, and the most distinguished men of the world. So, in certain sense, it may be said that Grant was fortunate in the manner of his death.—Atlanta Constitution.
