#### CHANGE IN SUGAR REGULATIONS

Mr. M. M. Myers, Power County's genial food administrator, has received official notification that there will be no more sugar available for fruit canning in Idaho this year. He has also been notified that the restaurant allotment has been increased from two pounds per ninety meals to three pounds per ninety meals.

And further that the individual allotment has been increased from two pounds per person per month to three pounds per person per month, and that families may purchase at one time without special permit a month's allowance figured on the above basis.

There is an influenza epidemic here in Arbon. Several families of six and eight to a family, are all down. There have been several calls for physicians but due to the influenza at Rockland, American Falls, Malad and vicinity, the doctors can not come when first called, but Dr. Schiltz of American Falls and Dr. Ray are doing their best for the sufferers, coming out whenever they possibly can. There is an urgent call for doctors here every day.

Mr. Perry Howell came down with the influenza Saturday.

Mrs. Mable Catherine Floyd, wife of E. L. Floyd, of Arbon, died last Thursday at their home here of pneumonia, after an illness of short duration. Remains were taken to Pocatello, where funeral services were held Friday afternoon. Deceased was a lovable woman, wife and mother and is survived by her husband and five small children; also a brother, Harry Hill of this place.

The family of Frank C. Turner have been seriously ill with influenza, all being down at once. Mrs. Arbon and Mrs. Davis are doing what they can for them.

Rennie Evans took the U. S. mail to Pocatello last Friday, as all of Heber Wood's family were ill with the Spanish flu.

Dr. Ray, of Malad, came over Sunday morning to the home of Mr. Geo. Bandy. His son, Richard, was seriously ill with pneumonia, but Dr. Ray thinks he has a chance to recover now, although his left lung is badly affected.

Mr. C. D. Porter, Orville Porter and Mrs. C. W. Weidemann are quite ill at the Porter home with influenza. Mrs. Porter, who had been ill in bed with the same thing, had to get up to nurse the others.

#### To the Voters of Power County.

Being a candidate for re-election to the office of County Assessor, I desire to make a brief statement relative to my candidacy.

Having served you for a period of five years as assessor, I am very familiar with conditions in all parts of the county, being personally acquainted with practically all the taxpayers and have knowledge of most of the property owned by them. Also am acquainted with the assessments in the surrounding counties, from attending meetings of the State Board of Equalization.

During my term in office, I have endeavored to assess all property on an equal basis to the best of my ability and have tried to get a list and assess all the property of the large interests as well as the smaller farmers, and have been criticised for taking the trouble of going to the Portneuf river and counting a bunch of cattle I had right to believe had not been given in for taxation correctly and where I found there were some 1900 head of such cattle were not listed and was evidently escaping taxation.

I have taken similar action several times throughout the county and on each occasion have added considerable to the tax rolls.

I have also been criticised for having a deputy in my office doing my work for me, and want to take this opportunity of denying this statement. I had D. G. Brown employed in my office during the spring when it was necessary for me to be in the field, but have not had him employed since July 1st, when the tax roll was turned over to the county auditor, although he has been employed by the auditor since that time in assisting on the tax rolls, and as clerk to the local draft board, but has not been employed by me, neither has his salary been charged to my office.

Owing to a scarcity of room in the auditor's office, Mr. Brown has been doing some of his work in my office which gives some people an opportunity of saying he is in my employ.

During my term as assessor there has not been over six complaints made to the board of equalization, and the board has never made more than one or two changes in my assessments.

If the voters of this county feel that I have been fair in my assessments and treatment, I will appreciate your support for re-election next Tuesday.
