Rev. Richards, during the ban on meetings, has been at his former parsonage, at Allsop, Oregon. While there he harvested his potato crop and developed an appetite which would be frown upon by Mr. Hoover and other particular people. The exercise was apparently not harmful to him.

Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Watts received a letter from their son, Sergeant Lawrence Watts, Wednesday. The soldier is working in the transportation service of the French government. All men in the American forces who have experience in transportation, be it wagon, car, truck or railroading, are eagerly snapped up by the allied armies. At the time Sergeant Watts wrote the letter he was engaged day and night in making up military trains headed for the front.

The influenza epidemic appears to be checked in American Falls and the near vicinity. It is also reported to be less frequent in outlying parts of the county. However, the ban on public meetings and on schools has not been raised. The state board of health has decided to be slow about raising the ban, believing that a little caution is the better policy.

A. A. Friesen was in from Cedar Creek settlement Wednesday and reports an experience that was common to many people in all parts of the county. Seven members of his family were down with influenza at the same time, leaving him the only one to be up. He had their care and the care of the farm as well, as it was impossible to get anyone to assist at that time.

The local exemption board has received instructions to discontinue the sending of questionnaires to registrants above 46 years of age but to proceed with the classification of all under that age. It is probable this is only a precautionary act and will not mean that any of the last registrants will be called, unless the unexpected happens and it becomes necessary to police Germany and discipline the Bolsheviks of Russia.
