WILL SURRENDER KAISER ON DEMAND OF ALLIES

Holland Would Rather Intern Hohenzollerns for Life. But Will Abide by Allies' Decision—Breach of Neutrality May Cost Netherlands Some Territory.

If the allies insist upon the delivery of the former German emperor and crown prince to an international court of justice, Holland will yield, but will first urge that the allies content themselves with an undertaking by Holland to intern them for life in one of the Dutch colonies, according to an Amsterdam dispatch to the London Express.

Holland it is understood, will suggest that Herr Hohenzollern and his son be placed on an island in either the East or West Indies, where they will be guarded by a Dutch fleet.

It is also anticipated that Holland will be asked for compensation for permitting a violation of her neutrality by allowing German troops to pass through the province of Limburg on their retreat from Belgium, and for receiving German ships from Antwerp.

This compensation, says the correspondent, may possibly be the cession of certain territory along the Belgian frontier, owned by Holland since 1839, perhaps the southern part of Dutch Limburg, the population of which region is claimed to be principally Belgian.

The formation of an international jury to try the former German emperor is gaining wide support in France, the Matin says.

Attorney General Lescouvé, after an investigation, has transmitted to the ministry of justice the charge of murder made against the former emperor by Madame Prieur, whose husband was killed in the torpedoing of the steamer Sussex. The attorney general said that he considered the charge admissible in the French courts.

THE "FLU"

Its Cause and Prevention.
During the fall and winter months of every year, colds and sore throats are very common.

When neglected, bronchitis and pneumonia often follow, the result in many cases being death.

Twenty years ago the old-fashioned influenza cold disappeared and in its place was born "La Grippe." One winter in particular the form was exceptionally severe and was christened "Russian Grippe."

This year the same old malady has reappeared with a new name—"Spanish Influenza."

Helped by weather conditions, insufficient clothing, a weakened resistance caused by the changed mode of living, owing to war conditions, it has assumed an epidemic form and all over the country has disorganized social and business conditions.

The Death rate has been alarmingly high, due not so much to the "flu" as to the fact that little had been done to guard against pneumonia and "backsets" which followed.

The weather conditions started the "flu" and it will keep up, more or less, until the cold, frosty weather sets in, notwithstanding the quarantine regulations. The "flu" abated during each cold snap, to start up again as the weather got warmer.

To believe that you "caught" the "flu" from some one else, is to shift the responsibility from your own shoulders to those of another person, not realizing that you got it thru your own personal neglect. If you lived right, your body would be able to accommodate itself to the changing weather conditions, fall and spring.

Don't blame the other fellow because you got the "flu." Don't spend your time worrying about who is going to give you the "flu"—spend it in taking care of yourself:—dress properly, with good warm clothes; sleep properly, with plenty of fresh air; eat properly, eat plenty of good, nourishing food. Don't expose yourself to draughts or dampness—keep warm and dry!

Maximilian Harden Says the Kaiser Should Have Run Cabaret.

"The kaiser missed his vocation; he should have managed a cabaret," declared Maximilian Harden, in an interview with the Berlin correspondent of the London Express.

"The kaiser had no personal part in the war. He was discredited and became a tool of the junkers. They thought him a coward and feared he would fall to sign the declaration of war, so they sent him to Norway. Foreigners saw the kaiser's facade, but never saw his interior.

"The armistice terms are hard. If they form they form the basis of the peace terms, Germany will be ruined. By losing possession of Alsace-Lorraine and Silesia, she cannot become an industrial country. Millions of Germans are sincere. The entente should treat them as men, not as militarists."

Many Soldiers Tried in 1918.

During 1918 a total of 642 officers and 11,595 men underwent military trials, as against 121 officers and 7,712 men in 1917, according to the judge advocate general's annual report. Desertion proved to be a prolific source of trials. There were 3,358 charges of desertion brought, put on only 1553 approved convictions.
