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**NEWS OF OUR NEIGHBORS**

**Bernard Nuxoll of the Green Creek section, came in Saturday on a furlough from camp Justice, Va.**

**The Orofino schools reopened Monday, after an extended vacation on account of the flu epidemic.**

**Eldred Elliott, a soldier in Uncle Sam's army, stationed at Camp Justice, Va., was recently discharged and arrived at his home in the Vollmer section last Saturday.**

**Lloyd McLean, who has been in the army service at Camp Dodge, Ia., has been discharged and arrived at his home near Mohler last Saturday. Orville Butrey, of Ho, also arrived Saturday from the same camp, having been discharged.**

**Karl C. Frank, the tombstone man of this section with headquarters at Kamiah, is adding a new 18x28-foot building and considerable improved machinery to his plant. He now employs a force of four to eight men and is able to furnish a product second to none.**

**Capt. John Kelly arrived home Wednesday from Fort Sheridan, Ill., where he has been attached to the general army hospital. The captain is imbued with the spirit of the work of the medical department of the army. He is at present attached to the service on indefinite leave of absence.—Winchester Journal.**

**Schools Close Again.**

**Superintendent Rehberg was taken with the influenza last Friday and two other teachers, Mrs. Omans and Miss Mae McLeod, were ill also, so the school was closed at once and will probably remain closed until the flu is entirely wiped out of Kamiah. There had been considerable discussion about closing through the week, but the illness of the superintendent and so many of the teachers settled the matter without action of the board. **Ben Lookingglass Dies Suddenly**

**Ben Lookingglass, one of the leading men of the Nez Perce Indians, as well as one of the wealthiest, died suddenly Saturday morning of heart failure. He had been in his usual health up to the night before, when he was stricken and lived only a few hours. The funeral was held Monday afternoon, there being only a service at the grave in the Indian cemetery north of town. Lookingglass was sixty-four years old and had lived all his life in the vicinity of Kamiah. In his early years he was one of the powerful men of the tribe and later became one of its councilors and much respected men. He was one of the largest land holders of the tribe, owning hundreds of acres of fine land on the Nezperce prairie, as well as having other property and money. His wife died a number of years ago and of a family of twelve children all have died excepting his son Dave, who is the sole heir of his father. A brother, Henry, of Kamiah, and two sisters, Susie, of Kamiah, and Martha, of Lapwai, survive him.—Progress.**

**Live Stock Market**

**for the week ending Dec. 28. Receipts of live stock at this market for the week ended Friday, December 27th were: 788 cattle; 32 calves; 848 hogs; 37 sheep and 2 horses and mules—totaling 31 earloads.**

**The week just ended was one of the lightest for all classes of live stock in many months past. The light movement of live stock was brought on, no doubt, by the Christmas holiday which, like other years, affects shipping. The prices of cattle began to advance the early part of the week and each day's sales was an improvement over the previous day's trading. Good steers seem very scarce and but very few are being offered. The cow stuff is mostly plain but is selling readily at extremely low prices. The bulk of canners for the week met sale at 5c. Advanced quotations follow: Steers, 12.00 to 13.00; cows, 7.50 to 8.50.**

**The hog market was strong all during the week but did not meet with advances equal to cattle. The bulk of the early offerings met sale at \$16.65, with the bulk of closing sales making \$17.15 per cwt. An advance of 25 cents per cwt. is noted and a firm market exists with prime mixed at 17.00 to 17.25; medium mixed, 16.75 to 17.00; rough heavies, 14.75 to 15.00; pigs, 15.00 to 15.25; stockers and feeders, 12.00 to 14.50.**

**The sheep receipts so far this winter have done little toward supplying the local demand. Although prices have advanced to near their former prices, but few shipments have responded to the strong demand. An exceptionally strong market exists at the following quotations: prime lambs, 12.00 to 13.50; prime yearlings, 10.25 to 11.50.**
