MEXICAN REBELS FIGHT WITH AMERICAN TROOPS

EL PASO, Texas, Aug. 12.—A band of Mexican rebels was caught trying to smuggle ammunition across the line from Columbus, New Mexico, by United States soldiers and the two forces
